Will Bay State liberals rejoice as English officials revive surprise warrantless home searches?

A new law restricting gun rights in the United Kingdom insults the Common Law principle that a man's home is his castle and is a fair warning for Massachusetts gun owners of what is coming their way. Or put another way, the trampling of constitutional rights in the man-hunt for Boston Marathon bombers, was not a one-off. Rather, it is part of the new way police do business. "This is an alarming development in Great Britain," said Alan Gottlieb, the chairman of the Washington State-based Citizens Committee for the Right to Keep and Bear Arms. "Constitutional activists concerned not only with their Second Amendment rights but also their Fourth Amendment rights.

The British Home Office announced its policy, effective Oct. 15, that allows for warrantless surprise searches. In the previous policy, all gun owners were subject to house searches by appointment. The new unannounced visits must be based on an intelligence report that there is a threat to public safety afoot. In reality, this red hot intel will amount to some joker whispering to a police officer. In the United States we see this already in the prank calls to law enforcement that lead to SWAT personnel surrounding unsuspecting families with high-powered military style long guns. This is called "Swatting." In California, there is now a new law that allows family members dime out a relative and have the relative's gun rights taken

away. Hardly the legal process one might expect when it came to suspending an American's constitutional rights. While English legal traditions have been cast aside, bizarrely there is something of English manners survives. Police officers are cautioned against springing a home search on gun owners at an "unsocial hour" unless the threat is pressing. Then, there is this gem from the Home Office: "It is recognised that there are no new powers of entry for police or police staff when conducting home visits. To mitigate any misunderstanding on the part of the certificate holder the police must provide a clear and reasoned explanation to the certificate holder at the time of the visit." For Americans, the right to keep and bear arms is clear cut and enshrined in the Second Amendment. Their rights to be secure in their homes is set out in the Fourth Amendment of the Constitution: The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers, and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated, and no warrants shall issue, but upon probable cause, supported by oath or af-

firmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons or things to be seized. While on the topic of gun rights, the Massachusetts Constitution abandons citizens to armed criminals and depending on the make-sure-you-go-home-at-the-end-of-the-shift police officers. But, the state constitution's Article XIV offers the idea of a man's home as his castle remaining: "Every subject has a right to be secure from all unreasonable searches, and seizures, of his person, his houses, his papers, and all his possessions." But, remember after the Boston Marathon bombings? Then, the police went door-to-door looking for the two brothers, with a steady pace fortified with only their triple-time pay and coffee and doughnuts. England has some of the most restrictive gun laws in the world and its support of civil rights is spotty. The trouble is that liberals look to England as the model to emulate, no longer the model to revolt against. Let's hope when liberals call come to bring English-style surprise home searches to Massachusetts other voices are willing to speak up.

Medford detectives were performing surveillance in the area of Edwards and Dexter Sts in Medford, when they first observed Mass Reg 692KE3. The driver is well known to the Medford PD Narcotics Unit due to his involvement with controlled substances. Medford detectives observed the M/V make a stop in the vicinity of defendant Marino's address. They observed defendant Marino and another W/M enter into the M/V. Marino entered into the front side passenger seat and the other W/M (unknown at this time) entered into the rear passenger compartment of the M/V. The M/V went on the move and started to make a series of stops/starts in the middle of the streets. At this point, Medford det. placed a call to Det. J. Hyde to assist in this investigation due to the possible jurisdictional issues. Det. Collazo and I also assisted in this investigation. The SPD units took up surveillance on the Somerville/Medford line. The M/V was now located in the area of Meacham St at Fremont St. Somerville. The M/V pulled over to the side of Meacham St in Somerville near the Medford line. All 3 individuals were still placed in the M/V. After a brief period of time, the unknown W/M exited the rear passenger compartment of the M/V and started walking on Meacham St. The M/V pulled out onto Meacham St and headed toward the intersection of Moreland St. At this time, a M/V stop was conducted and a threshold inquiry was initiated. As Det. DiFronzo and I approached the M/V, we observed a package of needles, a spoon w/ some white residue on it, and a rolled up piece of white paper, bound by an elastic, in the passenger side front seat area occupied by defendant Marino. Marino was asked to step out of the M/V and he complied. Det. DiFronzo advised Marino of his Miranda Warnings at this time. Post Miranda, Marino stated the following to Det. DiFronzo and I: "The operator just finished inhaling some Heroin through the straw on the front seat". He

was asked if he had any sharp objects or contraband on his person and he replied "no". Det. DiFronzo performed a quick pat down and felt a box type object in Marino's left, front sweat pants pocket. As Det. DiFronzo opened the pack of Marlboro cigarettes and he observed an empty box, save for a small, glassine baggie in the bottom of the box. When Det. DiFronzo handed it to me, I observed this baggie to contain a brown, powdery substance (Heroin). When I asked defendant Marino who owned the pack of cigarettes, he stated that he just picked them up and put them in his pocket as we were walking up to the car. Det. Hyde was conversing with the driver at this time. It became very apparent to Det. Hyde that he appeared to be very unsteady on his feet and unable to communicate. Det. Hyde formed the opinion that he was suffering from the perils of a possible Heroin overdose. He immediately called 911 to alert EMS to respond to our location. EMS responded and the driver was administered a dose of nasal Narcan by EMS that appeared to alleviate his affliction. He was eventually transported to the Somerville Hospital for treatment. As we were interacting with Marino, Det. Collazo went to speak with the unknown W/M at this time. The male was walking along the Meacham St sidewalk, in the same direction as the M/V that was pulling away from the curb. When the W/M observed the Cadillac being stopped by the undercover units, he attempted to duck into a side yard. As the W/M was about to open the gate to the yard, Det. Collazo came up from behind him and stopped him from entering. At this point, Det. Collazo recognized the W/M as Randy Gilchrist. Det. Collazo asked Gilchrist what his business was in the house he was in front of. Gilchrist answered that he was there to see his friend, yet he could not give Det. Collazo a name for his friend that lived in the house. At this point, Det. Collazo performed a search of Gilchrist. Det. Collazo located a \$20.00 bill in his waist area. Det. Collazo took this \$20.00 bill and opened it up. He

observed a brown, powdery substance (Heroin) in the folds of the \$20.00 bill. Det. Collazo handed the \$20.00 bill over to me. Both individuals were transported to the Station, via the Prisoner Transport Vehicle, Wagon #200. While at the Station, at the booking window, a property inventory search was conducted on Gilchrist by Off. Moreira. Off. Moreira located a round, orange pill, marked w/ "AN 415" in a secret, zippered compartment of the defendant's wallet. Off. Moreira handed over the pill to me. It was preliminarily identified as Subox-one 8MG/2MG.

At approximately 9:41pm on October 22, 2014 I, Officer Salvatore Fusco while assigned to the East 1 patrol car responded to Innerbelt Road for a report of a motor vehicle accident. Upon my arrival I was approached by witness who was standing next to a black pick-up with another male later identified as Mark Harvey. The witness said that he was walking towards his vehicle a 2004 Honda Pilot when he observed the black pick-up speed backwards and strike the left front fender of his vehicle. He said that the pick-up then pulled forward and attempt to turn around at which time he gained the operator of the vehicle Mark Harvey's attention. The witness further stated that he attempted to exchange information with Mark Harvey and that Mark Harvey said that he had no registration for the vehicle and refused to show him his drivers license. After speaking to the witness I approached Mark Harvey and asked if he was the operator of the pick-up at which time he said yes. I then advised him that I was going to require his license and registration so that I could file an accident report. It was at this time that I observed that Mark Harvey was unsteady on his feet and I could also detect a slight odor

of alcohol coming from him. I then asked Mark Harvey to walk over to the doorway of the building with me so that we could get out of the wind and rain. We then walked up to a level loading dock area at which time I told Mark Harvey that I suspected that he had been drinking alcohol and that he was impaired due to its consumption. Mark Harvey replied that he had one beer earlier with a friend. While speaking to Mark Harvey I observed that he was unable to stand steady without leaning on the wall. I then asked him for his license at which time he pulled several items from his wallet including his license and was unable to separate his license from the other items which included what appeared to be a couple of credit cards. I asked Mark Harvey if he was willing to take a series of test that would determine his balance and coordination. He agreed to take the tests and prior to administering the tests I asked him if he was diabetic or if he had any injuries that would prevent him from taking the test to which he replied no to both. The first test that I administered to Mark Harvey was the Horizontal Gaze Nystagmus. I instructed him to take his Index finger and touch the tip of the pen at which time he touched the side of the pen. I then told him to follow the pen with his eyes without moving his head as I was going to have the pen travel back and forth from shoulder to shoulder at eye level. He was unable to follow the pen and would only move his eyes slightly and then return them to center and turn his head. I repeatedly told him that I needed him to move his eyes without moving his head but he was unable to do so. I then told Mark Harvey that the next test that I was going to administer was the one leg stand. I told him that he was going to stand with his arms by his side and stand on one foot and count to 30 by one thousands such as 1-1000, 2-1000, and 3-1000 and so on and that I was going to demonstrate the test to him first. After demonstrating the test to him, Mark Harvey attempted to take the test and was unable to perform

the test as he kept placing his foot on the ground beginning with count one and two and almost falling at count five. When he again stumbled at count eight I stopped the test. I then demonstrated to Mark Harvey the Nine step walk and turn. I showed him utilizing a straight line in the concrete that he needed to walk heel to toe for nine steps while counting them out and that at the end of the nine steps that he needed to make small steps in order to turn around and count and repeat the nine steps. Mark Harvey was unable to walk heel to toe and stepped of the line at steps three, five, six and stumbling off the line at step seven and was unable to turn without stumbling. It was at this time that I stopped the test and made the determination to place Mark Harvey Under arrest for operating a motor vehicle while under the influence of Alcohol. Mark Harvey was transported to the Somerville Police Station by Unit 200.





THE HOUSE AND SENATE. There were no roll calls in the House or Senate last week. In a recent Beacon Hill Roll Call report, we listed the votes of local legislators on the proposal to repeal the indexing of the gas tax to the Consumer Price Index (CPI) beginning in 2015. The tax would be adjusted annually, without a vote of the Legis-lature, based on any increase or decrease in the CPI. There is no limit as to how high the tax could go but it could not dip below 21.5 cents per gal-lon. This proposal to repeal the indexing is now on the November ballot as Question #2.

In order to give a more com-plete picture, we are again listing state legislators' votes on the repeal of the index-ing but adding votes on a transportation package that includes several tax hikes as well as the indexing of the gas tax to inflation beginning in 2015.

REPEAL AUTOMATIC GAS TAX ADJUSTMENTS House 53-95, Senate 8-31, rejected an amendment that would repeal the automatic annual adjustment of the gas tax hike. (A "Yes" vote is for repealing the automatic adjustment. A "No" vote is against repeal and in favor of the automatic adjustment.)

Patricia Jehlen No **VOTE ON APPROVING MILLIONS IN TAX HIKES PLUS INDEXING THE GAS TAX** House 106-47 and Senate 34-6, approved a transporta-tion package that includes an estimated \$500 million in tax hikes plus the indexing of the gas tax to the CPI beginning in 2015.

Gov. Deval Patrick vetoed the package. The House 123-33, and the Senate 35-5, then overrode the veto and the hikes became law. Patrick said he vetoed the pack-age because it did not raise enough revenue. Some supporters said the

package is a reasonable and responsible one that will provide millions in revenue to begin to solve many of the structural and financial prob-lems that plague the state's transportation system. House Speaker Robert DeLeo said, "I think that we have provid-ed a good piece of legislation providing proper financing for transportation for many years to come."

Other supporters said they reluctantly voted for the package as the lesser of two evils. They said they would rather vote for these hikes than vote to sustain the gov-ernor's veto and have the pro-cess start from scratch again with the looming prospect of passage of an even bigger tax package that Patrick wants. Sixteen Democratic legisla-tors who voted in favor of overriding the veto of the tax hikes had previously voted against the hikes. One of these legislators, Rep. Josh Cutler (D-Duxbury), said, "This override was a vote against the governor's push for even higher taxes. It's as simple as that." MassGOP Chairman Kirsten Hughes had a different perspective.

"(Some) Democrats caved in to the Beacon Hill bosses and voted for a massive tax hike that even some Democ-rats said will hit middle class families hard," said Hughes. The 16 Democrats who initially voted against the tax hikes and later voted for them include: Sens. Kathleen O'Connor Ives (D-Newbury-port) and James Timilty (D-Walpole); Reps. James Arcie-ro (D-Westford), Brian Ashe (D-Longmeadow), Bruce Ayers (D-Quincy), Sean Curran (D-Springfield), Josh Cutler (D-Duxbury), Stephen DiNatale (D-Fitchburg), Di-ana DiZoglio (D-Methuen), James Dwyer (D-Woburn), Colleen Garry (D-Dracut), Danielle Gregoire (D-Marl-borough), Paul Heroux (D-Attleboro), Thomas Petrolati (D-Ludlow), Walter Timilty (D-Milton) and Jonathan Zlotnik (D-Gardner).

Opponents said the proposed tax hikes will hurt already overburdened taxpayers and businesses and urged the state to live within its means. House Minority Leader Brad-ley Jones (R-North Reading)

said, "(The) vote in the House of Representatives is about one thing and one thing only — a crippling tax increase. Massachusetts taxpayers should not be lulled into a false sense of hope that the \$500 million tax increase ap-proved by House Democrats is better than the nearly \$2 billion increase being pushed by Gov. Patrick" (Both roll calls are listed. The first one is on approving the hikes. The second is on over-riding the governor's veto of the hikes. On both roll calls, a "Yes" vote is for the tax hikes. A "No" vote is against them.)

Patricia Jehlen Yes/Yes **ALSO UP ON BEACON HILL** **ALLOW LIQUOR STORES TO OPEN EARLIER ON SUNDAYS** (H 228) – Sunday, October 25 is the first Sunday that liquor stores are allowed to open at 10 a.m. Prior to the law going into effect, these stores were prohibited from opening until noon. A total ban on Sunday sales of alcohol was state law until 2003 when it was repealed. Supporters say the measure allows Bay State liquor stores to compete with those in border states that open before noon on Sundays. Opponents say studies have shown the earlier hours do not increase liquor sales but rather spread existing sales out over a longer period of time.

FLOOD INSURANCE (H 3783) – A law that prohib-its creditors from requiring homeowners to purchase flood insurance in amounts that exceed the outstanding balance of their mortgage took effect on October 21. Other provisions prohibit lenders from requiring coverage for the contents of a home or including a deduct-ible of less than \$5,000. Supporters say this would help reduce premiums for homeowners affected by new federal regulations that threaten to drive up the cost of flood insurance. Opponents express concern that the bill would leave some homeowners with insufficient insurance and said the bill

protects banks at the risk of homeowners. **OFFICIAL GROUNDHOG** (H 2864) – Ms. G., the popular groundhog at the Massachusetts Audubon Society's Drumlin Farm, as of October 29 is the official groundhog of Massachu-setts. Ms. G. is the Bay State counterpart to Pennsylvania's Punxsutawney Phil. The mea-sure also requires that the popular groundhog be used as a mechanism to educate elementary school children on the importance of meteo-rology.

The bill was filed by Rep. Alice Peisch (D-Wellesley) on behalf of elementary school students at the Hunnewell School in Wellesley. Many of these types of bills are filed by legislators on behalf of classes of students as part of an ex-ercise for youngsters to learn about the legislative process. **VOLLEYBALL** (S 1627) – Volleyball will be the state's "official recreational and team sport" effective October 29. The proposal was spon-sored by former Sen. Michael Knapik (R-Westfield) and Rep. Aaron Vega (D-Holy-oke) on behalf of elementary school students at the Mau-rice A. Donohue School in Holyoke to help them learn about the legislative process. Supporters noted that volley-ball was invented in 1895 in Holyoke by William Morgan. Legislation making basket-ball the "official state sport" (different from the "official recreational and team sport") was signed into law in 2007. Many Patriots and Red Sox fans disagree with both of these designations.

DISABLED VETS' TAX EXEMPTIONS (H 2617, H 3645) – Two bills that offer tax exemptions for veterans have been stuck in a House committee for more than a year after being given initial approval in October 2013. One bill would make more disabled veterans exempt from the auto sales tax and auto excise tax. Current law offers these exemptions to disabled veterans who buy a disabled veterans license plate for their car

Investigator called for Cannon to come to the security office. Cannon had just finished his shift and left the building, but returned when he was called. When Cannon arrived, investigator informed him that he had observe him stealing a package earlier in the day during his shift, and told Cannon that he had reviewed video surveillance footage and observed him steal a package on 10/21/14 as well. Investigator informed Cannon that he was investigating smart phone thefts and then showed Cannon the video from 10/21/14. After watching the video Cannon uttered "damn" and stared at me. I asked Cannon to have a seat and then read him his Miranda Warnings directly from my pocket card. Cannon stated he understood his rights. At this time Cannon stated he was willing to make a voluntary statement. I asked Cannon what he did with the package he had stolen earlier in the day. Cannon stated he had second thoughts about taking the package and decided to throw it away in the bathroom. investigator recovered the package which was opened, but did not contain a smart phone, but rather a Basic Talk phone modem valued at \$29.99. I asked Cannon if he had thrown this package away because it was not a phone and he just shrugged his shoulders. I then asked Cannon what he had done with the package he was seen taking on the video. He stated "that's this", and held up the iPhone 6 smart phone that was in his hand. I asked

him again if that phone was what he had stolen on 10/21/14 and he stated "yes". I asked Cannon if he had stolen any other phones and he said "a couple others". I asked him what he had done with them and he stated "I don't have them". Cannon then stated that other people were doing it too, and said he was approached by another employee he called "R" who said to him "we can both make money". Cannon stated he had a 3 month old child and a girlfriend and was looking to provide for them. Investigator asked Cannon if he would be willing to give a written statement on the incident. Cannon agreed, but then said he was not willing to talk about "R's" involvement because he could get killed over this. Cannon expressed concerns for his own safety. When asked Cannon refused to elaborate on what "R's" real name was and then stated he was done answering questions. At this time I informed Cannon he was being placed under arrest. Unit 200 was called to the location and Cannon was transported to the Somerville Police Station via Unit 200.



Alleged Shoplifter at Assembly Row Kiely arrest age 33

On 10/24/14 at approximately 16:45 while in uniform and assigned to a walking route at Assembly Row, I was dispatched to Saks Fifth Avenue for a report of a shoplifter. Officer Ubeda, assigned to

On October 25, 2014 at approximately 02:10 hours, while on uniform patrol assigned to Marked cruiser East One along with Officer Kim assigned to marked cruiser East four we were both dispatched to Great River RD on the third floor apartment for a report of a large group fighting in inside. Upon my arrival I was flagged down at Great River Rd and greeted by two security guards, we went into the building attempting to locate the fight on the third floor and looking for apartment. We came across a couple of females that were around the corner of apartment in the stairs way that leads to the parking lot. They had scratches on her bodies and some of their clothes were torn. They both stated that one female party was assaulted and that they both tried to break up the fight. Initially both females refused to give any information and kept insisting that they had nothing to do with what had happened. After asking several times eventually I was able to identify both female parties. The first female party identified herself as Claire Pierre Mrs. Pierre stated that she was not involved and that she tried to break up the fight. She appeared to be bleeding from her finger nail and had several scratches on her neck and arms. The second female party identified herself as Nikia James. Mrs James stated that her cousin was being assaulted by four unknown females, when she and her friend saw that they jumped in and attempted to stop the fight. Mrs. James had some scratches around her arms and chest. She had some

hair on her hands. When I asked both parties how the perpetrators looked they could not give me a description. All they said was "they look like us". Meanwhile Officer Pulli had stopped a couple of motor vehicles, allegedly some of the people in them were involved. While I spoke to the people inside the vehicle Officer Pulli and Officer Goncalves found a female party who was lying on the ground and appeared to be severely beaten. Tommy Cremens Memorial Bench Unveiling Event in Somerville By William Tauro

 Thomas L. Cremens 52, A 20-year resident of Woburn, formerly of Somerville, died on September 11, 2011. This past Friday a memorial bench in his name was unveiled and presented to the city of Somerville to be placed at Dilboyl Field in Tommy's name. The ceremony was a very well attended event. Tommy's wife Cathy, daughters Abbie and Jillian along with many friends, family, elected officials as well as Arthur Wahlberg of the hit television series "Wahlburgers" was also there to show his support for the Cremens family. Special thanks went out to Somerville Mayor Joseph Curtatone, former Mayor Gene Brune and Alderman Jack Connelly who spoke at the event. The event was hosted by Jim Halloran and paid for by the Thomas Cremens Foundation and the Cremens family. The bench was fabricated in Thomas's memory by Chris Santini of Santini Welding of Medford who is an iron worker for Local 7 and who runs the family business in medford.

Thomas Cremens formed a lifetime long lasting friendships with many Red Sox players. Tom was a former bat boy for the Boston Red Sox and an employee of the Town of Winchester School System and he had many ties to the City of Somerville. An article was recently written about Thomas by Marvin Pave for The Boston Globe and as a request from the family we printed it for the world to see. "Tommy Cremens; friendship with Sox, community went deep" Mr. Cremens built lifetime friendships with Red Sox players. By Marvin Pave Globe Correspondent / September 17, 2011 When Tommy Cremens, a red-haired teenager from Somerville, worked as Red Sox clubhouse and bat boy in the mid-1970s, it was the beginning of a lifelong friendship with outfielder Bernie Carbo, pitcher Bill Lee, and several other players who were part of the team's 1975 World Series showdown with the Cincinnati Reds.

Carbo and Lee were so fond of Mr. Cremens that during one West Coast road trip they drove to Hurricane Ridge in Washington where the trio walked among the wildflowers and took in the magnificent view. "Tommy said it was one of the most memorable days of his life," Lee said. Mr. Cremens was best man at Carbo's wedding in 1994 and his right-hand man at Carbo's Diamond Club Ministry Fantasy Camp. He also was clubhouse attendant for the Winter Haven Super Sox of the Florida Senior League and that team's New England barnstorming troupe, the Grey Sox, 20 years ago. Mr. Cremens, who worked in various positions for Northwest Airlines at Logan Airport, including as a baggage handler and a deicer of planes, and was employed in the maintenance department of the Winchester public schools, died Sept. 11 at Boston Medical Center of injuries suffered the previous day in a fall from a ladder at his home in Woburn. The former Somerville High football captain was 52.

"When I played with the Red Sox, Tommy used to invite me to his parents' home for dinner," Carbo said. "Now I'm godfather to his younger daughter Abigail. Our families are like one." A 1977 graduate of Somerville High School, Mr. Cremens received his bachelor's degree in management in 1987 from the University of Massachusetts Boston. He was captain of that school's varsity lacrosse team. Mr. Cremens, a Woburn resident for more than 20 years, was known in the community for being willing to pitch in when neighbors needed a helping hand. The annual Christmas party at his home was a neighborhood tradition. Mr. Cremens held youth lacrosse clinics for many years in several communities, mainly northwest of Boston, and was formerly boys' lacrosse coach at Matignon High of Cambridge. He played summer league basketball in Cambridge and ice hockey in Waltham with his older brother, Joe, who resides in Medford. "All the Red Sox could count on him," Joe Cremens said. "He would take Carl Yastrzemski's

mother shopping. Yaz would just give him the car keys. Red Sox owner Tom Yawkey respected Tommy's work ethic and loved him like a son. And he could always find Jim Rice's favorite takeout meal." Mr. Cremens's cousin, attorney Ken Lakin of Lexington, said Mr. Cremens "always had a smile on his face." "He had boundless energy, and he took great pride in his wife and daughters," Lakin said. "And he always shared his Red Sox memorabilia with family and friends." The collection includes the old Grey Sox uniforms, worn by former major league players including Boston's Carbo, Bob Stanley, Bill Buckner, Roger Moret, Mario Guerrero, and Dave Stapleton. "Tommy started out at Fenway Park cleaning up and polishing shoes, and when Al Forester used to drive the cart in from the bullpen, Tommy would take my warm-up jacket," said Lee, who resides in Craftsbury Common, Vt. "I used to play ball with Tommy's friends, and we all loved him. He was fiery and tough,

1Pie crust, chilled
4 ozBacon, sliced thin
3Eggs
1 1/2 cupHeavy cream
pinchNutmeg
to tasteSalt, pepper
1 tbspButter, diced
Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Place foil over pie crust and weigh down with dried rice or beans. Once oven has reached temp, place pie crust

into oven and bake for 8 minutes. Remove crust from oven and remove foil and weights. Place crust back into the oven for 3 minutes or until it starts to brown. Remove and set aside. Drop oven temp to 375 degrees. Meanwhile, in a medium pan, over medium heat, start to cook your bacon until it becomes lightly brown. Remove and place onto paper towels to drain excess fat. Place bacon across bottom of pie crust. Beat eggs, cream and seasoning together and pour into the HOT pie crust. Place quiche in 375 degree oven and bake for 30 minutes, or until the quiche has risen and slightly browned. Serve warm or chilled. Whether you choose to prepare the classic, my twist or your own interpretation, remember that food is about bringing people together and that the act of cooking is about caring and as long as your heart is in the dish you prepare, the people you are cooking for will appreciate it (and you). Shoplifting at Target Celona arrest age 29 and Leone age 27

On 10/26/14 at approximately 20:04 while in uniform and operating marked unit E2, I was dispatched to Target for a report of two male suspects in the store attempting to cut security wires attached to merchandise. Officer Ducasse also in uniform and assigned to marked unit E3 was sent as my back up. Upon arrival, we were met outside by Asset Protection Specialist, who reported that the suspects were still in the store. I asked Officer Ducasse to report to the

asset protection office while Asset Specialist and I wait by the exit doors for the suspects. He informed me that last night around 21:01 the same suspects along with a third unidentified individual came into the store, used a cutting devise to remove wires attached to merchandise on the shelves and successfully escaped prior police arrival. At the exit door, I observed the first suspect coming down the aisle passing all the cash registers to make his way out. I stopped him and took him to the asset protection office where he was left with Target Protection Specialist. Shortly after, I observed the second suspect sprinting toward the exit doors. As soon as he saw me, he ran toward

a different direction. I ordered him to stop and he attempted to run past me. I was able to grab him by his arm and he actively resisted. At that moment, Officer Ducasse and street supervisor Sgt. Isidoro came over and assisted in restraining and escorting him to the asset protection office. Both suspects were identified as Mr. Thomas P. Celona, and Mr. Michael W. Leone. Target surveillance camera shows Mr. Celona with a cutting devise removing the wires from the merchandise and Mr. Leone placing them into a plastic bag and his pockets. Both suspects were dressed in the same clothing description as the night before. I recovered a set of Dre Beats ear buds in Mr. Leone's pockets, and two Flex Fit

Pedometers - all three items totaling \$399.98.





The proposal would also offer the exemptions to disabled veterans who qualify for but have not purchased the special plate. The second measure exempts from the excise tax disabled veterans who lease cars. Current law only provides the exemption for a disabled veteran who buys the car.

Last week, Gov. Patrick announced that the state had awarded a \$566.6 million contract to CNR MA, a Chinese rail car manufacturer, to supply the MBTA with 284 new Red Line and Orange Line cars to be assembled in Springfield. Some critics said the contract should not be awarded to a Chinese company because of China's human rights violations. "The bidders have been thoroughly vetted ... (the process) has been transparent and rigorous and competitive," Gov. Patrick. "The board and the governor

made a terrible mistake by awarding them the contract. Massachusetts people are blessed with a legacy of fighting for human rights and freedom. I believe today, by their (the board's) vote, their great record was tainted, deeply tainted ... The profit goes directly into the Chinese government and therefore strengthens a regime of continuing oppressing its own people." Chai Ling, one of the student leaders in the 1989 Tiananmen Square protests in China. "We will abide by all the laws and we pay much attention to our employees. We care (about) our employees ... We are the leading rail car manufacturer in the world. We cannot be this if we are tough to my employees." CNR MA President Xiwei Lu. "We should vet any company we are doing business with from around the world on their human rights record ... There are a lot

of people who have questioned the human rights record of the Chinese." Rep. Byron Rushing (D-Boston), noting the state has refused to do business with countries that have poor records on human rights including South Africa and most recently Myanmar. "We hired a Chinese company. We didn't hire the government of China, and they're the largest rail manufacturer in the world. They've not only built trains for China, but they've built trains for places like Australia and New Zealand, and they've done an exceptional job." Transportation Secretary Richard Davey.

HOW LONG WAS LAST WEEK'S SESSION? Beacon Hill Roll Call tracks the length of time that the House and Senate were in session each week. Many legislative sessions are only one aspect of the Legislature's job and that a lot of important work is done outside of the House and Senate chambers. They note that their jobs also involve committee work, research, constituent work and other matters that are important to their districts. Critics say that the Legislature does not meet regularly or long enough to debate and vote in public view on the thousands of pieces of legislation that have been filed. They note that the infrequency and brief length of sessions are misguided and lead to irresponsible late night sessions and a mad rush to act on dozens of bills in the days immediately preceding the end of an annual session. During the week of October 20-24, the House met for a total of one hour and 37 minutes and the Senate met for a total of four hours and 17 minutes. Mon. 

CITY SEEKS NEW FIRE STATION ON SOMERVILLE AVE

SOMERVILLE - A new six-bay fire station on the vacant lot at 515 Somerville Ave. would provide a modern facility that would replace the current and inadequate Union Square and Lowell Street fire stations and improve response time to emergencies, expand training for the City's firefighters, reduce wear and tear on equipment, and make more efficient use of the space at Fire Department headquarters. The City has submitted an order to the Board of Aldermen seeking to take the property at an appraised

value of \$4,875,000. A new station on that site would improve Fire Department's response capability, particularly to the Beacon Street and Washington Street areas currently first responded to by the engine from Union Square and the ladder from the Lowell Street station. The Fire Department could also undertake more training on the site, programs that the department cannot currently run due to lack of an adequate training facility. For example, the department last had a tower for ladder and rope training in the 1960s at the former Lowell

Street station, and such a facility could be part of the architectural design of the new station, along with additional training space below ground for confined space and trench rescue. The site would also accommodate all first line apparatus and spare apparatus stored at the Union Square station, while making better use of the Fire Department Headquarters at 266 Broadway, which due to its size cannot accommodate tandem parking of two fire pumps, nor allow ladder trucks to be moved out for daily performance checks. The 515 Somerville Ave. site would

also reduce wear and tear on the ladder and pumper trucks currently assigned to the Lowell Street station, which currently must climb and stop steep inclines responding from the station. Finally, the recommended site is close to Union Square, meeting the coverage demands of the department. Due to state law prohibiting the City from a traditional purchase of the property, the City has submitted a request to the Board of Aldermen to take the property from current owners DEVB LLC through an eminent domain taking for a

public purpose at a cost of \$4,875,000, the fair market value as determined by a state licensed appraiser. The price of acquiring the site and constructing the new station are expected to be offset by making the Lowell Street station site available for sale, as well as the sale of City-owned portions of the current Public Safety Building block in Union Square to the City's master developer partner for the square, Union Square Station Associates (US2).

Sen. Jehlen Running for Re-Election

State Senator Pat Jehlen is running for re-election in the Second Middlesex district, which includes Somerville. If re-elected, Jehlen says, "I will continue my work for seniors and to improve education, transportation, and the environment. I am always eager to hear the ideas and concerns of my constituents. When you share your opinions, it helps me represent you. And I'm glad to help with problems you bring to my office. It helps me understand the issues that people in our communities face and look for solutions." Jehlen previously served as state representative and on the Somerville School Committee. While on the school committee, she helped launch the Council for Fair School Finance. The council brought the lawsuit which led to 1993 ed reform commitments to more, and more equalizing, state aid to all communities. As Senate chair of the Committee on Elder Affairs, she is working to ensure that seniors have a choice of settings that meet their needs so that they can age in their communities. This year she is co-chair of commissions on Elder Economic Security, Protective Services, and LGBT Aging. She has worked for adequate funding for adult day health and home care services, and this year led the successful effort to give home care workers, who make an average of \$10 an hour, their first raise in 6 years. Jehlen is Senate vice-chair of the Committee on Education and was appointed to the Foundation Budget Review Commission, where she continues to work on issues of fair and adequate school finance. She is also working to reduce the over-reliance on standardized testing to judge schools, districts, and teachers. As co-chair of the MBTA caucus, she works with other legislators for adequate funding for the T, preventing fare increases and service cuts. This year Somerville saw the first new MBTA station in 27 years open at Assembly Sq, and Sen Jehlen is actively working with her colleagues in the Somerville Legislative Delegation to ensure that the MBTA completes its work on the Green Line Extension. She is also working with the MBTA, colleagues and the Somerville Community Corporation on the MassWIN-GLX plan to train and hire local workers for the p0rject She chairs the Mystic River Caucus, which this year secured funding for the next stage of the Mystic River Master Plan and the removal of invasive weeds in the river. Legislators in the caucus also successfully advocated for funds for flood control and water quality improvement. Previously Jehlen worked as a VISTA volunteer and teacher. She lives in Somerville with her husband, daughter, and two granddaughters. Their two sons and their wives live in Somerville and NYC. Jehlen was elected senator for the 2nd Middlesex District in 2005. She represents all of Somerville and Medford, and parts of Cambridge and Winchester.
