APPLY TODAY TO REVIEW PARTICIPATORY BUDGETING IDEAS AS A BUDGET DELEGATE VOLUNTEER

Somerville residents ages 17 and older can apply now to review ideas submitted for the City's first-ever round of Participatory Budgeting Applications due May 20, 2023

SOMERVILLE – The City of Somerville is now accepting applications from residents ages 17 and older to join the City's Participatory Budgeting process as Budget Delegate Volunteers. This role will give residents hands-on experience working directly with City staff to review Participatory Budgeting idea submissions and determine which 20 ideas will be voted on by their fellow residents. No previous finance or budgeting experience is required; all residents will be given training and background as needed.

The time commitment for Budget Delegates will consist of an orientation meeting (about two hours), tentatively scheduled for June 15, 2023. Then ten recurring, in-person, meetings will take place on Thursday nights from 6 to 8 p.m. starting in June and ending in August. The location of these meetings will be confirmed and shared shortly.

During orientation, Budget Delegates will have the opportunity to choose which of the five subcommittees they would like to join. A minimum of four people will sit on each subcommittee. If necessary, a Budget Delegate may be on multiple subcommittees to ensure this happens.

The subcommittees categories will be: Community-Wide Resources Parks & Green Spaces Streets & Sidewalks Arts & Culture Education

How many projects a sub-

committee will select for the final ballot of 20 will be determined by the proportionality of how many ideas were submitted in that category, with a minimum of one. The current list of ideas is available for the public to look at here.

Once the subcommittees are formed,volunteers will review and research each idea, in consultation with city staff, and narrow down a smaller selection to research further and grade based on the following criteria: Need (5 points) Impact (5 points) Feasibility (5 points)

With these criteria in mind,

as well as feedback from City staff on project cost, the subcommittees will select the final 20 allotted proposals for the ballot. All city residents will have the opportunity to vote on the selected proposals in September 2023.

MAN FOUND GUILTY IN CONNECTION WITH 2021 NORTH CAMBRIDGE SHOOTING

CAMBRIDGE – Middlesex District Attorney Marian Ryan and Cambridge Police Commissioner Christine Elow have announced that Che Meranda, 31 of Boston, was found guilty last week by a Middlesex Superior Court jury of two counts of assault with intent to kill, assault with a dangerous weapon, two counts of carrying a firearm and carrying a firearm while loaded, possession of ammunition, two counts of reckless endangerment of a child and discharging a firearm within 500 feet of a building.

These charges stem from an incident in August, 2021 in which Meranda drove through North Cambridge firing multiple rounds from his car at another man.

On August 25, 2021, shortly before 6:00 p.m., Cambridge Police received multiple calls for gunshots in the area of Pemberton and Middlesex Streets. When police arrived on scene they located a vehicle with obvious signs of ballistic damage. Further investigation revealed that Meranda and the other man, identified as Maurice Morris, exchanged gunfire while they were in separate vehicles in the area of Rindge Avenue and Clifton Circle. Several shell casings were located in the roadway from the intersection of Rindge Avenue and Clifton Circle to the intersection of Rindge Avenue and Clifton Place. Following the shooting Meranda fled the vehicle but was ultimately identified by investigators after a review of surveillance footage and by

was engaged in a gun battle while his two small children were in the car. While incredibly, no one was struck, the risk that was created is staggering,"said District Attorney Ryan.

"To truly address this type of gun violence we must aggressively address it through both enforcement and meaningful change to strengthen our gun laws," District Attorney Ryan continued.

Middlesex District Attorney Ryan has proposed a bill to create a new felony offense to appropriately punish a shooter who acts "without regard for the risk of serious bodily injury to another" but who shoots intentionally or recklessly and "hereby causes a substantial risk of serious bodily injury." The bill, H2433 "An Act relative to the reckless discharge of firearms" was filed in partnership with Representative Marjorie C. Decker. Maurice Morris was charged with Carrying a Loaded Firearm Without a License, Carrying a Firearm without a License, Possession of a Firearm Without an FID Card, Possession of Ammunition Without an FID Card, Armed Assault to Murder, Assault and Battery with a Firearm, Discharging a Firearm within 500 Feet of a Building. That case is scheduled for trial on October 23, 2023, in Middlesex Superior Court.

The prosecutors assigned to this case were Ashlee Mastrangelo and Edward Kim.

This case was investigated by the Middlesex District Attorney's Office, Cambridge Police, State Police assigned to the Middlesex District Attorney's Office, The U.S. Marshals Service, Boston Police Department, Everett Police Department, Medford Police Department and the Somerville Police Department.

SOMERVILLE 2023 YARD WASTE PICKUP BEGINS APRIL 18



SOMERVILLE– The City's yard waste pickup program resumes for 2023 on Tuesday, April 18. Yard waste is picked up weekly in the early spring (April 18 through May 12, 2023) and mid-to-late fall (October 10-December 8, 2023) and is picked up every other week during the intervening weeks. To check the full yard waste calendar, please visit somervillema.gov/yardwaste or call 311 (617-666-3311).

On pickup weeks, yard

waste should be put out with your trash and recycling on your normal pickup day and be placed in either a paper yard waste bag or you may use a trash barrel with a "Yard Waste Only" sticker on the barrel. Tree branches should be tied into bundles no larger than 3ft x 3ft.

Stickers are available free

of charge at the DPW Building, 1 Franey Road, or the Welcome Desk in the entrance of City Hall, 93 Highland Avenue. To request that a sticker be mailed to you, please call 311 or email 311updates@ somervillema.gov.

Please keep in mind that pickup will be on a oneday delay this week (April 17-21) due to the Patriot's Day holiday on Monday, April 17. Place trash, recycling, and yard waste out one day after your normal pick-up day. 



SOMERVILLE ANTI-DISPLACEMENT TASK FORCE SEEKS NEW MEMBERS FOR CULTURAL, RESIDENTIAL AND SMALL BUSINESS DISPLACEMENT COMMITTEES

The City of Somerville Anti-Displacement Task Force (ADTF), which was formed to research and recommend policies to prevent residential displacement, has now expanded to advocate for a wider range of the Somerville community, including small business displacement and cultural displacement.

The Task Force is seeking community members with an interest in working on anti-displacement policies to serve in a volunteer capacity on one of the Task Force's three committees: **Residential Displacement** Committee (RDC) Small Business Displacement Committee (SBDC) Cultural Displacement Committee (CDC) All committees are seeking both committee members and co-chairs.

Residency in the City of Somerville is not a requirement to serve on the Task Force, though applicants should have a direct connection to Somerville and the committee they are applying for. More information on the specific qualifications encouraged to join each committee can be found below.

Residential Displacement Committee

The Somerville Residential Displacement Committee will be made up of community members, professionals in anti-displacement, city staff, and city council members, who will work with City staff to research and develop policy and programming recommendations aimed at reducing the rate of displacement of Somerville's residents over a yearlong period.

The RDC will research and evaluate different options for addressing displacement including but not limited to rent stabilization. The Co-Chair will work with the City staff assigned Co-Chair to manage the agenda and work of the RDC.

Applicants for the Residential Displacement Committee should have professional or lived experience with residential displacement or otherwise have a strong interest in working on issues of anti-displacement in Somerville. 



POLICE STORIES

On April 16, 2023, I, Officer Ferrara, was in full uniform working for the Somerville Police Department, assigned to marked unit East-1. At approximately 1842 HRS, I was dispatched along with Sector East to the area of 698 Assembly Row, for a report of a white male wearing a white shirt and tan pants with a blue duffel bag threatening people with a knife.

Upon arrival, I was flagged down by one of the victims XXXX, in front of Starbucks (700 Grand Union Boulevard). XXXXX stated that the subject, Quentin HARRIS, took off towards the Christmas Tree Parking lot (177 Middlesex Ave). I then followed XXXX in my cruiser and began checking the Christmas Tree parking lot. XXXX then screamed out that HARRIS was trying to get into a car stopped at a red light at the intersection of Fellsway and Middlesex Ave.

I then observed the male party en

tering a 2016 white Toyota Corolla bearing MA REG XXXX which was stopped at the red light. I then activated my lights and pulled my cruiser out in front of the vehicle at the red light. The vehicle pulled to the side and stopped. I gave the male party, who was later identified as HARRIS, an exit order to get out of the vehicle he had just entered and placed handcuffs on him for my safety. I asked him if he had a knife on him which he replied he was not sure if he still had the knife on him or if he dropped it. Ofc. Thompson then searched HARRIS and found a black switch blade in his side pocket. I then told HARRIS that he was placed under arrest and called for 200.

I spoke to the operator of the vehicle, XXXX. XXXX stated that he was stopped at the red light when HARRIS approached his car while he was on the phone. HARRIS told him that he had just missed his bus and asked XXXX if he could give him a ride up the street and that he would pay him. XXXX agreed and unlocked his car and HARRIS entered the back seat of his vehicle. XXXX then saw my cruiser at the light and saw that the bags HARRIS was carrying had security tags on them and he then pulled his vehicle to the side.

I then spoke to the two victims, XXXX and XXXX.

XXXX stated that he and XXXX work for Assembly Row Security.

XXXX stated he was leaving CVS at 495 Grand Union Blvd and began walking towards Southern Kin when he saw HARRIS in front of Southern Kin with two blue duffel bags with the security tags still on them. XXXX told HARRIS that he needed to return the items to the store. HARRIS then told XXXX that he was going to slice him up with his knife if he did not get away from him. XXXX then called this into Assembly Row Security and stated that he was going to follow HARRIS. XXXX then responded to XXXX location. XXXX then followed HARRIS to the bike path across from 698 Assembly Row and asked him a

second time to stop and return the items. XXXX stated that HARRIS looked at them and said "Are you guys serious?" HARRIS then pulled out a black switch blade knife out of his side pocket and began walking towards XXXX and XXXX swinging the knife at them. XXXX and XXXX began to advance backwards. HARRIS then took off again towards Starbucks and XXXX and XXXX followed him. XXXX then saw my cruiser pulling up and flagged me down.

I asked XXXX if any of their cameras in the area would have caught HARRIS swinging the knife and he was not sure if it would catch the area they were in but told me he could provide any footage that we needed upon request.

I then went to TJ MAX to return the stolen property. A manager at TJ MAX rang the clothing and bags up and told me the total amount of stolen property was \$570.92.

Based on the facts at hand, HAR-RIS was arrested for the following charges:

REAL LIFE SOMERVILLE POLICE STORIES: (A&B W/ DANGEROUS WEAPON, A&B ON PERSON OVER 60 OR DISABLED ARREST



The following report is a brief summary of incident #23020338:

On April 15, 2023, I, Officer Dylan Lambert, was working my assigned shift in marked unit East-1. At approximately 5:26 PM, I was dispatched to the area of Bairos Liquors located at 78 Broadway, Somerville, MA in regards an injured party that was bleeding. As I was enroute, Somerville Dispatch informed me that the injured party may have been assaulted. Somerville Dispatch radioed that the suspect was still on scene, but was attempting to flee. All of the East-End Patrol Units responded to assist.

When I arrived in the area I saw that Somerville Firefighters appeared to be rendering aid to a party. I was flagged down by multiple people, who pointed to the

suspect. The suspect, who was later identified as Mr. Richardo Nunes Silva, was with his wife, Ms. XXXX. I radioed to Somerville Dispatch that the suspect was in front of Sullivan Liquors. I got out of my cruiser and told Mr. Silva to stop. I told Mr. Silva that I was detaining him because he was suspected of hitting a party in the head with a bottle. Mr. Silva appeared to have a dried substance on his lips and left hand that appeared to be blood. Mr. Silva yelled no multiple times and that he didn't do anything. Ms. XXXX attempted to grab on to Mr. Silva as I was trying to detain him and she dropped to the ground. Mr. Silva attempted to pull his arm away to avoid being handcuffed, but I was able to place him in handcuffs. I then attempted to assist Ms. XXXX up. I asked Ms.

XXXX if she needed any medical atten tion, to which she said no.

While detained, Mr. Silva kept asking to go home and said that he didn't do anything. I asked Mr. Silva if he needed any medical attention, to which he said no. Mr. Silva didn't appear to be injured and the dried blood could have been from the victim.

report. Detective Costa told me that the victim's name was Mr. XXXX (DOB: XXXX). Detective Costa took a picture of Mr. XXXX injuries, which will be digitally attached to this report.

Sgt. Berrouet arrived on scene and assisted with translating. Mr. Silva primarily spoke Spanish, but could communicate some what in English. Ms. XXXX primarily spoke Spanish. Sgt. Berrouet attempted to get an account of the incident from Ms. XXXX, but she was very upset, and would yell in Spanish. Sgt. Berrouet was unable to get a statement from Ms. XXXX. Sgt. This bill would require the Lottery to create a second chance Lottery game involving all paper lottery tickets and cardboard scratch tickets that do not contain winning numbers.

Supporters said this second chance game would encourage the return and recycling of millions of losing lottery tickets that otherwise are carelessly tossed out in stores and on the streets and contribute to the litter problem.

"While there is currently an anti-lottery littering regulation in place, it does not go far enough to ensure lottery tickets and scratch tickets are redeemed and recycled," said State Senator Patrick O'Connor (R-Weymouth). "These tickets are constantly being found on the side of the road, in our parks and in our oceans. We can do better. Massachusetts had a very successful second-chance

lottery game, the Clean Fund Sweepstakes, from 2001 to 2007 and it is time we revisited the concept to help keep our public spaces clean."


