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SOMERVILLE COMMUNITY PRESERVATION ACT PROGRAM SEEKS INPUT FOR FUTURE PROJECTS



Online Survey Now Available for Community to Share Ideas and Priorities for CPA-Funded Projects.

Virtual Public Hearing Will be Held on Wednesday, March 27, starting at 6:30 p.m.

SOMERVILLE – The Somerville Community Preservation Committee is inviting residents to participate in shaping the future of their neighborhoods by providing input on potential projects to be funded by the Community Preservation Act (CPA) in the coming year. CPA in Somerville has a history of supporting a diverse range of initiatives, including rehabilitating playgrounds and schoolyards, making historic public buildings safe and handicapped accessible, building affordable housing, and supporting rental assistance.

CPA is a grant funding program that aims to address the needs and priorities of the community. Before launching the next funding round the Community Preservation Committee (CPC) is actively seeking input from the Somerville community to identify the greatest needs and priorities in the upcoming year. Are there historic buildings that would benefit from repairs? Outdoor community space or recreation needs? How can CPA funds help to advance equity in Somerville? The CPC wants to hear from you.

Residents are encouraged to participate in a virtual public hearing scheduled for Wednesday, March 27, at 6:30 p.m., where they can share their ideas and suggestions directly with the Community Preservation Committee. Program delivering local housing support to help families often underserved by federal and state programs

SOMERVILLE – Mayor Katjana Ballantyne announced today the City of Somerville's Office of Housing Stability's (OHS) new Municipal Voucher Program that targets needed local support to families historically underserved by broader government housing programs.

"We know that families in need of housing help are falling through the gaps, and our new voucher program will help Somerville families that need it most secure stable, local, housing so they can continue to thrive here," said Mayor Katjana Ballantyne. "Our Housing Needs Assess-

ment showed that households with young children and households including persons of color, especially Black and Latino persons, are disproportionately impacted by local affordable housing challenges. I'm happy to share that we have already secured housing for eight participating families, and want to thank everyone from the City and our advocacy partners for the creative problem solving that made this program a reality."

Housing voucher programs that subsidize housing costs are usually the domain of state and federal programs. But many families fall through the gaps or can only receive very minimal support. Somerville's program introduces a new option for vouchers offered at the city level for the most vulnerable local families.

Under Somerville's Municipal Voucher program, participating families' rent and utility costs will be capped at 30% of their income, with the voucher covering remaining rental costs. This applies even if their net household income is zero. The voucher program will

cover all remaining rent and the security deposit.

The program is targeted to households paying at least 50% of income for rent and utilities, who are ineligible or poorly served by federal or state housing programs, and/or who are facing eviction or severe overcrowding. Families with children in the Somerville public schools or local daycare programs were prioritized. The pool of candidates were identified through a collaborative effort between the Somerville Public Schools (SPS), Somerville's anti-poverty agency the Community Action Agency of Somerville (CAAS), Somerville Homeless Coalition (SHC), and the City's Somerville Office of Immigrant Affairs (SOIA) and its Office of Housing Stability (OHS). Twenty-seven families were selected to receive a voucher via an internal lottery system and OHS is hoping to increase this number to 30.

"The devastating impact of involuntary displacement on children in our public schools who often have already experienced trauma led us

to work as creatively and as doggedly as possible to find a solution for as many of these at-risk families as possible," said Ellen Shachter, Director of Somerville's Office of Housing Stability. "Seeing the first eight families move into their new homes was a priceless experience."

The Cambridge Housing Authority (CHA) will oversee the logistics of voucher recipient placement. Somerville's OHS team has secured 12 project units for some of the selected families to move into, while the remaining families will work with CHA to use their vouchers to find new housing or stay in their current household with an MVP rent subsidy. Each family will be assigned a stabilization worker from CAAS to help them access government resources and maintain their stabilized housing.

The program has built-in incentives for participating landlords, including receiving a month's rent as an incentive payment, the security deposit, and some funding for property repairs.

Recipient families will work with their CAAS stabilization worker and CHA to annually recertify their eligibility. Unlike most housing subsidy programs, tenants' rent will not increase between annual recertifications allowing them to benefit fully from increases in their income.

The program, funded through the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) until December 2024, has received commitments from the Affordable Housing Trust Fund and the City to sustain operations through the calendar year 2026. The City has contributed \$1.8 million, matched by the Trust, with funds allocated through free cash.

About the Somerville Redevelopment Authority

The SRA is dedicated to enhancing the livability and prosperity of various areas within the City through the implementation of urban renewal. This transformative process focuses on redevelop-

ing underused or substandard areas, guided by community outreach, presenting a vision for redevelopment, and, when necessary, justifying the use of eminent domain—a governmental action where private property is acquired for public use, with fair compensation and support for existing tenants or residents.

Current Projects
The SRA is actively engaged in urban renewal plans in Union
Square and Winter Hill, with an ongoing demonstration project plan at 90 Washington Street. The Authority regularly evaluates the suitability of urban renewal in other areas.

Responsibilities and Commitment SRA members are expected to attend monthly board meetings lasting approximately 90 minutes, ten to twelve months a year. Meetings involve discussions on the progress of urban renewal projects and voting on related matters. Members may also be required to attend special sessions. Preparation for each meeting typically involves reviewing materials (1-3 additional hours).

Membership terms last for five years, and members must reside in Somerville.

Virtual Meeting Will Highlight Initial Design Concepts and Collect Neighborhood Feedback

SOMERVILLE – Mayor Katjana Ballantyne, Ward 6 Councilor Lance Davis, and Ward 5 Councilor Naima Sait

invite you to join a virtual community meeting to learn about flood relief and water quality improvement efforts planned for Morrison Avenue (Cedar Street to Grove Street) and the surrounding neighborhood.

The meeting will take place Monday, March 25, at 6 p.m. Visit somervillema.gov/morrisonave to learn more.

At this meeting, City staff will introduce the project and share initial concept designs. Following the presentation, residents will have the opportunity to ask questions about the project and provide feedback.

The City of Somerville is making substantial systemwide investments to modernize its sewer and stormwater

infrastructure. As part of this effort, the City will be installing new drainage infrastructure and rehabilitating the existing sewer

system along Morrison Avenue (between Cedar Street and Grove St.) as well as throughout the surrounding neighborhood. This project will reduce flood risk in the surrounding area and help maintain the water quality of local rivers.

In addition to the underground utility improvements, this project will also include street safety improvements and green infrastructure (drainage features designed to mimic natural processes such as irrigated planting areas,

bioretention basins with select soils and plants that catch and filter stormwater, and new trees) throughout the neighborhood.

This project is one of a series of actions the City is undertaking to reduce water pollution, address flooding, and modernize Somerville's infrastructure. Final designs are currently anticipated to be completed by fall 2025. Construction is anticipated to begin as early as spring 2026. All schedules are preliminary and subject to change.



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








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

BAN EMPLOYERS FROM ASKING FOR CREDIT REPORTS (H 1434

The House approved and sent to the Senate legislation that would prohibit employers from obtaining the credit reports of existing or potential employees except in certain circumstances including hiring for a position that requires national security clearance; a position for which a person is required by federal or state

law to obtain a consumer report; and some executive or managerial positions at a financial institution.

The [bill] reduces barriers to employment by limiting the use of personal credit reports in the hiring process," said sponsor former Duxbury representative Josh Cutler who is now Gov. Maura Healey's Undersecretary of Apprenticeship,

Work-based Learning and Policy in the Executive Office of Labor and Workforce Development. "Credit scores were never intended to be used for employment purposes and pre-employment credit checks can create needless barriers for otherwise qualified workers. Eleven other states already taken similar steps."

Sen. Mike Barrett (D-Lex-

ington), the Senate sponsor of the bill, did not respond to repeated requests from Beacon Hill Roll Call to comment on the bill and its

NATIVE AMERICAN GRAVES PROTECTION AND REPATRIATION ACT (H 3248)

The House gave initial approval to a bill that applies the federal law known as the Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act to any museums and state agencies that receive state or local funding in the state

of Massachusetts.

The federal law, according to the National Park Service's website, requires that federal agencies and museums receiving federal funds take inventory of Native American human remains, funeral-related and sacred objects

and provide written summaries of other cultural items. The agencies and museums must consult with Indian Tribes and Native Hawaiian organizations to attempt to reach agreements on the repatriation or other disposition of these remains and objects. Once lineal

descent or cultural affiliation has been established, and in some cases the right of possession also has been demonstrated, lineal descendants, affiliated Indian tribes or affiliated Native Hawaiian organizations normally make the final determination about the disposition

of cultural items.

Co-sponsors of the bill, Reps. Dave Rogers (D-Cambridge) and David Biele (D-South Boston) did not respond to repeated requests by Beacon Hill Roll Call to comment on their proposal.

ASSAULT A TRANSIT WORKER (H 4355)

The House gave initial approval to a bill that imposes a prison sentence of between 90 days and 2.5 years or a fine of between \$500 and \$5,000 on a person who assaults a transit worker while the transit worker is performing his or her

duties. The measure also expands the definition of assault to cover flinging a bodily substance including blood, saliva, mucous, semen, urine or feces.

"Before the Carmen's Union approached me with this issue, I had no idea how bad these experiences were," said sponsor Rep. Joe McGonagle (D-Everett). "Seeing the statistics, hearing the stories, it is very hard to ignore. It is imperative that our transit workers are able to perform their jobs safely, knowing they have support and protection."

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














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

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


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GOVERNOR MAURA HEALEY MOVES TO PARDON MISDEMEANOR MARIJUANA POSSESSION Continued from front page

Governor Healey has issued an executive order that would pardon misdemeanor marijuana possession convictions that occurred in Massachusetts before March 14, 2024.

If approved by the Governor's Council at its upcoming March 27 meeting, the pardons will apply to hundreds of thousands of people who were convicted of the offense which is no longer an offense. The Bay State decriminalized marijuana

possession in 2008 and then legalized it on a ballot questions in 2016.

In October 2022, President Biden issued a presidential proclamation that pardoned many federal and D.C. offenses for simple marijuana possession. In December 2023, he expanded that pardon to include more offenses and issued a call for governors to take action to pardon marijuana convictions in their states.

"Nobody should face barriers

to getting a job, housing or an education because of an old misdemeanor marijuana conviction that they would not be charged for today," said Healey. "We're taking this nation-leading action as part of our commitment to using the clemency process to advance fairness and equity in our criminal justice system. We're grateful for President Biden's leadership on this at the federal level and proud to answer his call to take action in the states."

"Marijuana laws have signifi-

cantly changed over the past decade, and it's essential that our criminal justice system adjusts with them," said Lt. Gov. Kim Driscoll. "Gov. Healey's proposed pardon represents an important step toward righting historic wrongs, particularly around our country's misguided War on Drugs. We thank the Governor's Council for their careful consideration of this recommendation and look forward to continuing our progress to make Massachusetts a more fair and equitable home for all."

"Because of this pardon recommendation, many people in Massachusetts may get a second chance," said Carol Rose, Executive Director of the ACLU of Massachusetts. "It means people will no longer be punished for behavior that is now legal in our state, and will face fewer barriers to housing, jobs, education, student loans, and stability. We thank Gov. Healey for her leadership on this lifechanging issue."

CONSIDER TAX CREDIT FOR COMPANIES THAT PROVIDE EARLY EDUCATION AND CARE (S 2697)

The Senate 7-32, rejected an amendment that would require a study which would make recommendations on employer-supported early education and care benefits, to include possible creation of a tax credit for employers that provide these early

education and care benefits to their employees.

Amendment supporters said this amendment does not create a tax credit but simply requires a study of the possibility of one. They said that all options should be looked into and put on the table in order to help support employers that provide child-care.

"The bill already includes a new competitive grant program to incentivize employers to invest in additional early education and care slots for their employees," responded Sen. Jason Lewis who opposed the amendment. "Furthermore, a federal

tax credit has been available to employers since 2001 and has proven ineffective in expanding access to affordable early education and care for workers."

GOP Minority Leader Sen. Bruce Tarr (R-Gloucester), the sponsor of the amendment, did not respond to repeated requests by Beacon Hill Roll Call to comment on his amendment and its rejection.

(A "Yes" vote is for the amendment that would include the possibility of tax credits in the study. A "No" vote is against the amendment.)

\$500 STIPEND FOR NON-PROFIT BOARD MEMBERS (H 4358)

The House gave initial approval to a bill that amends a current law which provides that a non-profit group lose its civil liability protection if it pays any amount of stipend to a board member. The bill would allow the non-profit to retain its civil liability protection as long as the stipend is not more

than \$500.

Sponsor Rep. Alice Peisch (D-Wellesley) noted that federal law currently allows this \$500 stipend. "This change would allow nonprofits to provide board members with this modest stipend, facilitating their service and improving board representation," said Peisch.

DEBT COLLECTION PRACTICES (H 4429) – The House gave initial approval to a bill that would make some changes in the current state laws about debt collection practices.

The measure includes increasing from 85 percent to 90 percent the percentage of a person's wages that is protected from garnishment.

Another provision reduces from the current 12 percent to 3 percent the maximum interest rate that can be charged for judgements issued after 2024.

Supporters said the bill would help people to eventually pay off their debts without being overburdened by them and will ensure that no one in Massachusetts will be imprisoned for failure to pay a consumer debt.

"The [measure] creates commonsense consumer protections to prevent wage garnishment, reduce interest rates on debts and keep more money in the pockets of working families," said co-sponsor Rep. Christine Barber (D-Somerville.)



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EARLY EDUCATION AND CARE CHANGES (\$ 2697)

The Senate 40-0, approved and sent to the House a bill aimed at making early education and care money more accessible and affordable for young families across the Bay State. The bill would make high-cost state grants for early education and care providers permanent; increase the income threshold to make more families eligible for childcare subsidies; and establish recommended salary and benefit guidelines for early childhood teachers commensurate with K-12 public school teachers.

Under current law subsi-

dies are limited to households whose incomes equal up to 50 percent of the state median income, or \$73,000. The bill would raise the eligibility threshold to 85 percent of the state median income, or \$124,000 for a family of four.

"Access to high-quality, affordable early education and childcare is essential for the healthy development of young children, as well as for the economic well-being of working families and employers in the commonwealth," said Sen. Jason Lewis (D-Winchester), lead sponsor and Senate Chair of the Committee on Education.

"With the passage today of the Early Ed Act, Massachusetts is demonstrating national leadership in addressing the broken early education and childcare system in our country."

"From my first day in the Senate, I have been pushing for expanded access to early education and increasing staff salaries to ensure educators can earn a good living," said Sen. Sal DiDomenico (D-Everett). "This critical legislation will drastically expand access to affordable, high-quality, early education and childcare and deliver significantly better pay and benefits for early educators. I am proud

to support this bill which helps move our state one step closer to guaranteeing every child will receive world-class education from childhood through adulthood. We must get this bill over the finish line and keep our state a livable and welcoming home for families of all incomes."

"An equitable and competitive commonwealth is one in which every child and family has access to affordable quality early education," said Senate President Karen Spilka (D-Ashland). "At the same time, we must recognize the incredible work of the providers who are shaping the minds and

hearts of our earliest learners. Today I'm proud that the Massachusetts Senate is once again taking action to lower costs for families, open up more opportunities for children, increase pay for our early educators and make support for providers permanent so they can keep their doors open and thrive for years to come.

the presentation, residents will have the opportunity to ask questions about the project and provide feedback.

The City of Somerville is making substantial systemwide investments to modernize its sewer and stormwater infrastructure. As part of this effort, the City will be installing new drainage infrastructure and rehabilitating the existing sewer system along Morri-

son Avenue (between Cedar Street and Grove St.) as well as throughout the surrounding neighborhood. This project will reduce flood risk in the surrounding area and help maintain the water quality of local rivers.

In addition to the underground utility improvements, this project will also include street safety improvements and green infrastructure (drainage features designed to mimic natural processes such as irrigated planting areas, bioretention basins with select soils and plants that catch

and filter stormwater, and new trees) throughout the neighborhood

This project is one of a series of actions the City is undertaking to reduce water pollution, address

flooding, and modernize Somerville's infrastructure. Final designs are currently anticipated to be completed by fall 2025. Construction is anticipated to begin as early as spring 2026. All schedules are preliminary and subject to change.

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
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
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
