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MAYOR BALLANTYNE INVITES LOCAL TEENS TO APPLY FOR MAYOR'S 2024 SUMMER JOBS PROGRAM



SOMERVILLE – Applications are now open for the City of Somerville Mayor's Summer Jobs Program. Mayor Katjana Ballantyne encourages all interested local teens to apply. Interested teens can apply online now at somervillema.gov/summerjobs.

Applications are due by Sunday, April 28 . All applicants will be interviewed the week of May 13.

About the Mayor's Summer Job Program Every summer, the City of Somerville hires local teens to work with a variety of City departments, such as the Recreation Department, the Office of Sustainability, Parks and Open Space, the public libraries and more. Students are also placed with local businesses that partner with the program. The program encourages skill development and fosters deeper connections with the Somerville community.

Applicants must be at least 14 years old by May 5, 2024, and either be enrolled in a Somerville school, or be a Somerville resident. The time commitment is approximately 20 hours per week for six weeks starting in July, though actual schedules will vary by job site placement. The program will require onboarding and orientation. All positions are paid. The hourly rate is \$17.72.



\$375 MILLION FOR ROADS AND BRIDGES (H 4529)

The Senate 39-0. approved a bill that includes authorizing \$200 million in one-time funding for the maintenance and repair of local roads and bridges in cities and towns across the state.

The \$375 million package, a bond bill under which the funding would be borrowed by the state through the sale of bonds, also includes \$175 million for several transportationrelated grant programs. The House has already approved the bill and only final House and Senate passage are necessary before the measure goes to Gov. Healey for her signature.

The programs funded by the

\$175 million include the municipal small bridge program; the complete streets program; a bus transit infrastructure program; and grants for municipalities to purchase electric vehicles and the infrastructure needed to support them.

"The annual authorization of the Chapter 90 program provides cities and towns wit the state funding they need to most effectively address their transportation infrastructure needs," said Sen. Brendan Crighton (D-Lynn), Senate Chair of the Committee on Transportation. "This \$375 million total investment in both Chapter 90 and additional grant opportunities funds tangible improvements across our entire transportation network—including roads, bridges, access to mass transit and sidewalks."

"Getting around our communities is a fundamental part of everyone's day," said Senate President Karen Spilka (D-Ashland). "Whether the commute takes you on the sidewalk, through a bike lane, across a small bridge, onto your Regional Transit Authority or to the T, your journey should be quick and safe. By passing today's legislation, we are empowering our cities and towns with the funding to make improvements to the infrastructure our residents travel on, regardless of where they go and how."

"Our transportation infrastruc-

ture is so vitally important to the state's economy and this Chapter 90 funding addresses many outstanding issues in keeping the commonwealth's and public transportation system in peak operating condition," said Sen. Mike Rodrigues (D-Westport), Chair of the Senate Committee on Ways and Means. "I'm pleased that over \$375 million has been allocated to municipal roadways, local streetscape improvements and enhancements to our mass transit system,"

We're grateful to see the House and Senate swiftly pass the Chapter 90 bond bill with key investments in municipal roads and bridges," said Adam Chapdelaine, CEO of the Mass Municipal Association. "This quick action was essential with the construction season already underway. This year, we'll again be advocating for the Legislature to supplement these programs through dedicated funding via the new state surtax. Last year, supplemental Chapter 90 aid via the surtax provided an additional \$100 million for the 30,000 miles of municipal roads, which went to great use in communities all across the commonwealth."

HOUSE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE PROPOSES \$57.9 BILLION FISCAL 2025 STATE BUDGET

The House fired the second shot in the long battle over the state budget for fiscal year 2025 that begins on July 1. Gov. Maura Healey fired the opening volley in January when she filed her version of the spending package. The House Ways and Means Committee last week unveiled its own \$57.9 billion version. It increases spending by \$1.9 billion, or 3.3 percent, over the current fiscal year 2024 budget. Debate on the House version is scheduled to begin soon. After the full House approves a version of the package, the Senate will follow suit with its own draft, and a House-Senate conference committee will eventually craft a plan that will be presented to the House and Senate for consideration and sent to the governor.



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

SOMERVILLE STREET SWEEPING RESUMES MONDAY, APRIL 1

SOMERVILLE – Mayor Katjana Ballantyne and the Somerville Parking Department are reminding all residents that regular street sweeping schedules officially resume Monday, April 1, and will continue through December 31, 2024.

Somerville's street cleaning program is an essential public works program that not only keeps our city cleaner but also reduces the risk of flooding and icing due to clogged storm

drains.

Residents and community members can check street signs to know when parking is unavailable due to sweeping. A recurring pattern was chosen in order to allow residents to plan ahead.

Find Your Street Sweeping Schedule & Avoid Parking Tickets On designated street sweeping days, vehicles must be moved from the side of the street being swept, as noted on signs posted on each street.

The penalty for not complying with street sweeping parking regulations is a \$50 fine. Community members are encouraged to familiarize themselves with the street sweeping schedule in areas where they park. The best way to do this is to read the signs on the street when you park. You can also sign up for street sweeping reminders.

Sign Up for Street Sweeping Reminders You can use the Somerville Waste Wizard below to find out when your street is being swept. Sign up to receive complimentary street sweeping notifications by selecting "Sign Up for Reminders."

MUST NOTIFY OWNER OF GAS OR ELECTRIC SHUTOFFS (H 1370)

The House gave initial approval to legislation that would require gas and electric companies to contact landlords within 14 days of a tenant's bill becoming past due. Supporters said the bill would allow for third party notifications as an extra measure of protection against having their gas or electric service shut off. Utility companies would be required to contact landlords within 14 days of a tenant's bill becoming past due. And if a tenant is out of town or overlooks the notice, the landlord will be notified and can give rectify the situation to protect their property from any damage due to a cessation of service.

"The purpose of this bill is to notify homeowners, particularly landlords, about a potential shutoff," said sponsor Rep. Jeff Roy (D-Franklin). "Currently, only the customer of reçord is given notice, which makes a landlord vulnerable to cessation of services which may harm their real property."

LOWER INTEREST RATE ON PROPERTY TAXES DEFERRED BY SENIORS (H 2919)

The House gave initial approval to a bill which would lower the current flat 16 percent interest rate on property taxes that are deferred under the Senior Citizen Property Tax Deferral Program, which defers payment until the senior sells the property or passes away.

The bill would lower the rate to the prime rate plus

2 percent. The current prime rate is 8.5 percent which would result in a 10.5 percent interest rate.

"This legislation establishes more reasonable interest rates on the property taxes deferred under the senior citizen property tax deferral program, enabling more senior citizens to take advantage of the program and freeing up money for important items such as medication, housing expenses and health care," said sponsor Rep. Alice Peisch (D-Wellesley).

ARPA funded grants to support small businesses during their startup year when costs and challenges are high

SOMERVILLE—Mayor Katjana Ballantyne and the City of Somerville Economic Development Division announce

the New Small Business Vitality grant program. Funded by the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA), the program is designed to foster the vitality and growth of small businesses, providing essential support to budding entrepreneurs. The New Small Business Vitality Grant offers up to 12 months of rental support for new physical storefronts up to a maximum of \$50,000.

"It's well known that the startup costs and initial challenges of opening a new small business are a precarious time for budding business owners, and we also know that small businesses are the lifeblood of our squares, main streets, and local economy. So, it's a win-win to support new businesses that create jobs and offer services to our community while also paying local taxes to fund city needs," said Mayor Ballantyne. "We've pumped more than \$4 Million into our local businesses since 2020 to help them get through the many challenges of the pandemic. This program now aims to put our newer businesses on strong footing as they come in to fill our vacant storefronts and support the vitality of our squares and main streets."

Eligibility is limited to newly established commercial storefronts, with a start date no earlier than January 2023. The application will be open from April 15 to May 15, 2024. The application is available in English and Spanish and support and outreach will be conducted in other languages.

The New Small Business Vitality Grant beneficiaries will receive reimbursements for both past and impending rent payments. To qualify, businesses must employ fewer than 20 full-time staff and engage in a lease agreement at the time of application. Grant amounts are tailored to individual needs, based on fair market rental prices. In return for this financial

support, grant recipients are expected to prioritize hiring within the Somerville community, particularly focusing on individuals from low to moderate-income backgrounds when feasible and appropriate. Additionally, businesses are required to strive to maintain operational status for a minimum of one-year post-grant receipt. Please note, this program is exclusive to physical brick and mortar locations and funds are limited; homebased enterprises do not qualify.

"With past grants, Somerville was able to support many small businesses through the Covid pandemic. Our team in Economic Development is excited that we can now extend financial support to the new busi-

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





2024-17 Article V Section 5-5 "Parking Locations and Prohibitions" is amended as follows: No Parking Any Time at the two parking spaces on Fairfax St. along the side of 357 Alewife Brook Parkway.

2024-18 Article XIV Section 14-2 is amended with the addition of the following language: Traffic Calming Petition - A petition indicating at least 9 residents, or 33% of the residents on the street (whichever is lower) support the implementation of a traffic calming device. 2024-19 Article XIV Section 14-3 is amended as follows: replace the current Warrants for Article XIV Installation table with "Proposed Traffic Calming Assessment Table -The City uses several metrics to assess the general characteristics of streets and the potential viability of traffic calming measures. A second group of metrics helps document priority considerations. Each metric is assigned a "Yes" or "No" designation. Metrics are described in more detail below."

2024-20 Article XIV Section 14-3 is amended as follows: replace the current Priority Ranking System language with "The above recommended metrics for Article XIV installation include a total of four thresholds and four priority considerations. The above analysis is used to direct data collection efforts to evaluate the proposed Traffic Calming Petition. After data collection, the proposed street is added to the traffic calming consideration list where it is evaluated alongside other traffic calming needs based on bi-annual data collection, community feedback, and staff recommendations. Traffic calming is also often implemented in pavement and sidewalk reconstruction projects through the City's Pavement Resurfacing Program. The length of time it takes to process a request and provide a recommendation, is subject to spring and fall data collection and the volume of requests. Streets at the top of the prioritization list will be more likely to receive funding and will be treated first.

2024-21 Article XIV Section 14-4 is amended as follows: replace the current Neighborhood Traffic Management Process with "(a) A resident alerts the City to a problem area, this can be done through methods such as contacting the City's 311 Services, emailing the Mobility Division, providing feedback as part of a project outreach process, or via a Councilor. (b) Neighbors complete a petition (Traffic Calming Request Form, included in Appendix B) including a written description of the location of concern and requires the signatures of at least 9 residents, or 33% of the residents on the impacted street(s) (whichever is lower). Upon submission, the petition will be verified with City records to validate the residency status of the petitioners. The petition must be signed by the inhabitants of households who legally reside on the street. Only one handwritten signature per household will be considered.

(c) Once the petition is verified, the City will collect data in order to prepare an analysis evaluating the criteria for implementation.

(d) After data collection, the proposed street is added to the traffic calming consideration list where it is evaluated alongside traffic calming needs based on bi-annual data collection, constituent requests, and staff recommendations.

(e) The Traffic Commission votes to adopt, reject or modify the recommendations made by the City, if there are impacts to regulations under Traffic Commission's purview (for example, impacts to curb-side parking).

Expansion of Poison-Free Abatement Measures: Introducing alternative poison-free abatement measures such as SMART Boxes, birth control methods, carbon monoxide pumps, and other emerging techniques to mitigate rodent populations.

Staffing Increases : Increasing staffing dedi-

cated

to rodent and vector control to bolster efforts in addressing rodent issues effectively.

Linking Pest Control Requirements to Permits : Strengthening regulations by linking pest control requirements to more permits, ensuring adherence to rodent management protocols across various activities.

Improved Data Collection:

Enhancing data collection methods to monitor secondary poisonings, diseases, and other impacts associated with rodent infestations.

bilitating the existing utilities in Winter Hill, Ten Hills, and the To support stormwater management in this area and beyond, the City is also installing new drainage infrastructure and constructing a new stormwater outfall pipe that will discharge to the Mystic River. This project will reduce flood risk in the surrounding area and help maintain the water quality of local rivers.

neighborhood west of Foss Park.

In addition to the underground utility improvements, this project will also include street safety improvements and green infrastructure (drainage features designed to mimic natural processes such as irrigated planting areas, bioretention basins with select soils and plants that catch and filter stormwater, new trees, etc.) throughout the neighborhood.

This project is one of a series of actions the City is undertaking to reduce water pollution, address

flooding, and modernize Somerville's infrastructure. Preliminary designs are expected to be complete by Fall 2024. Final design is anticipated to be complete during 2025. All schedules are preliminary and subject to change. Construction will follow.

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




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
