



CITY AND TOWN ASSESSORS (H 2112)

This bill amends current law which allows municipalities to give stipends to assessors who receive their Certified Assessment Evaluator certificate from the International Association of

Assessing Officers, or their Certified Massachusetts Assessor certificate from the Massachusetts Association of Assessing Officers, Inc. The bill increases the stipend municipalities may award for these certificates from \$3,000 to \$5,000 for fulltime assessors and also adds two new certificates which would result in the stipend.

"Assessors play a vital role in the financial issues of every city and town in the commonwealth," said sponsor Rep. Tom Stanley (D-Waltham). "This legislation improves the profession, enhances the assessor's skillset and improves taxpayer efficiency and services to property owners."

SUICIDE PREVENTION HOTLINE ON STUDENT IDS (H 1999)

This bill would require all public schools with grades 6 to 12, and all public and private colleges to include on their student identification cards the telephone and text number for the 988 Suicide and Crisis Lifeline.

The bill includes a provision that allows any schools and colleges which have a supply of old ID cards without the 988 line to continue to distribute those IDS until the supply is gone.

Supporters said that while suicide is a leading cause of death for people of all

ages in the United States, young people are particularly at risk. They noted that according to a study published by the National Center for Health Statistics at the end of last year, suicide was the second leading cause of death for Americans aged 15-24, representing a 56 percent increase in the previous decade. They argued that there are significant disparities in these numbers, with LGBTQ+ youth being at greater risk, and Black youth seeing a 73 percent increase in youth suicide rates in that same time period.

"It can be difficult for someone to reach out for help even in the best of times and it is essential that we seize every opportunity to provide the necessary resources for our children," said co-sponsor Rep. Jack Lewis (D-Framingham). "[The bill] is a vital step in connecting those in their most vulnerable years with the lifesaving help and assistance they need and put the commonwealth in line with the 19 states including Arkansas, Louisiana and New York who have passed similar legislation."

"This legislation is one

simple way we can make sure our students have the resources they need to help themselves and their friends in a time of crisis," said co-sponsor Rep. Natalie Higgins (D-Leominster). "The 988 Helpline is a critical support for our community, and ensuring all of our youth learn about it will help all future generations get the mental health support they need when they need it most."

AMERICAN SIGN LANGUAGE (H 466)

This bill would require that American Sign Language (ASL) be taught in all Bay State public elementary and secondary schools to increase interactions between hearing persons and deaf and hard-of-hearing persons, as well as children with autism. Current law allows but does not require schools to teach ASL.

"Every student deserves access to diverse lin-

guistic opportunities," said sponsor Rep. Carol Doherty (D-Taunton). "By requiring that ASL courses be offered for credit alongside traditional world languages in Massachusetts public schools, we're not only

fostering inclusivity for the deaf and hard-ofhearing community but also enriching our educational landscape with a vibrant and vital language."

SAFETY FOR FIREFIGHTERS (S 2712)

The senate 40-0, approved and sent to the House legislation that would create a public database of violations of the state's fire prevention laws and a public notification system to alert workers of violations.

The measure is designed to boost safety for firefighters and people conducting "hot work" including welding, plasma cutting and spark-producing construction. The proposed law has been ten years in the making and was first prompted by the March 2014 deaths of firefighters Edward Walsh and Michael Kennedy who perished while fighting a fire that was caused by welders, working without a city permit, on a building next door to the brownstone in which they died.

"This legislation represents

historic regulatory reforms that the Walsh-Kennedy Commission helped institute across the hot works and welding industry in Massachusetts," said chief sponsor Sen. Nick Collins (D-Boston). "Passing this legislation will ensure that the critical reforms, training, oversight and accountability needed to prevent tragedies like the Back Bay fire, will be the law of the land. We do this in honor of Boston Fire Lieutenant Edward

Walsh and Firefighter Michael Kennedy so that their sacrifices are not in vain."

"The heartbreaking loss of life in the 2014 Back Bay fire is a constant reminder of the importance of firefighter safety," said Sen. Walter Timilty (D-Milton), Senate Chair of the Committee on Public Safety and Homeland Security. "I am honored to have shepherded this crucial bill through the

committee. Today, the Senate's action represents an important step forward in ensuring that our remarkable firefighters have the resources that they need to keep themselves safe and protect our communities."

DEBT COLLECTION PRACTICES (S 2713)

The senate 39-0, approved and sent to the House a bill that would make some changes in the current state laws about debt collection practices.

The measure includes reducing from 12 percent to 3 percent the maximum interest rate that can be charged for judgments on consumer debt; increasing from \$750 per week to \$975 per week the amount of a person's wages that is protected from garnishment because of a debt; reducing from six years to five years, the time in which a company can bring suit to collect a consumer debt; and ensuring that no one is imprisoned for failure to pay a consumer debt.

"In Massachusetts, no family should have to choose between putting food on the table or making a minimum payment on a ballooning debt," said Sen. Paul Feeney (D-Foxborough), Senate Chair of the Committee on Financial Services. "Debt collection practices can, at times, be predatory, unlawful and designed to squeeze every dime out of middle-class and lowincome families, especially with the added burden of accumulating interest and

additional fees that are designed to push families over a financial cliff. The [legislation] will not eliminate debt or an obligation to pay, but it will add needed guardrails to protect hard-working families from financial ruin, give a lifeline to those caught in a debt spiral and help deliver hope to those in a vicious cycle."

"This bill aims to implement stricter regulations on debt collectors in order to prevent financial mistreatment of Massachu-

setts residents," said chief sponsor Sen. Jamie Eldridge (D-Marlborough). "It seeks to safeguard consumers' economic security during debt repayment, prohibit excessively high interest rates and eliminate the possibility of consumers being sent to 'debtor's prison' when facing legal action."

MEDFORD POLICE RESPOND TO ANIMAL CRUELTY CALL

This morning at approximately 11 a.m., officers responded to the area of Fellsway West and Sheridan Ave for a report of animal cruelty involving a man who was walking a group of dogs. According to witnesses, the man struck one of the dogs multiple times in the head and then lifted the dog off the ground by its collar in a harmful manner. One witness provided video evidence

to the officers, allowing them to identify the suspect.

The officers then responded to the suspect's home, where he was taken into custody.

Frederick Ingrando, 33, of Medford, was arrested and charged with Animal Cruelty.

The dogs, not owned by Mr. Ingrando who is a hired dog-

walker, were removed and are in a safe location awaiting pick up by their owners. The dog that was struck was taken to a local veterinarian to be evaluated.

This investigation is still ongoing.

Open House Will Showcase Proposed Street Safety Improvements and Collect Neighborhood Feedback

SOMERVILLE – Mayor Katjana Ballantyne, Ward 7 Councilor Judy Pineda Neufeld, and the City of Somerville Office of Mobility are inviting the community to an open house to discuss proposed new designs for Broadway between Clarendon Avenue and Alewife Brook Parkway. The event will be held on Saturday, April 13, from 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. at the West Somerville Neighborhood School (177 Powder House Blvd).

The City of Somerville is planning to reconstruct sidewalks and repave Broadway between Clarendon Avenue and Alewife Brook Parkway (Route 16). The City is taking this opportunity to redesign the street to make it safer for all people whether they are

walking or wheeling, cycling, taking the bus, or driving.

In the fall of 2023, community members shared their transportation safety concerns through a range of channels, including street outreach, community meetings, and a survey. The project team reviewed all feedback and has developed a new conceptual design for the street. Attend the open house to review this conceptual design, share your feedback, and ask staff questions. Refreshments and games will be provided.

Following the event, a recorded presentation and information about the conceptual design will be available on the project website. Additional opportunities for community members to share feedback will include an online survey and virtual office hours with Mobility Division staff on April 25 from 5:30 p.m. to 7:30 p.m. Questions and comments can also be submitted by emailing transportation@somervillema.gov and by calling 311 (617-666-3311).

This project is one of a series of actions the City is undertaking in pursuit of our Vision Zero goal of eliminating traffic fatalities and series injuries from our roadways. Final designs are currently anticipated to be completed by early 2025. Construction is anticipated to take place 2025-2026. All schedules are preliminary and subject to change.





SOMERVILLE STREET SWEEPING RESUMES MONDAY, APRIL 1



SOMERVILLE – Mayor Katjana Ballantyne and the Somerville Parking Department are reminding all residents that regular street sweeping schedules officially resume Monday, April 1, and will continue through December 31, 2024.

Somerville's street cleaning program is an essential public works program that not only keeps our city cleaner but also reduces the risk of flooding and icing due to clogged storm drains.

Residents and community members can check street signs to know when parking is unavailable due to sweeping. A recurring pattern was chosen in order to allow residents to plan ahead.

Find Your Street Sweeping Schedule & Avoid Parking Tickets
On designated street sweeping days, vehicles must be moved from the side of the street being swept, as noted on signs posted on each street.

The penalty for not complying with street sweeping parking regulations is a \$50 fine. Community members are encouraged to familiarize themselves with the street sweeping schedule in areas where

they park. The best way to do this is to read the signs on the street when you park. You can also sign up for street sweeping reminders.

COVID-19 REMEMBRANCE DAY (H 2987)

The House gave initial approval to legislation that would designate March 10th as COVID-19 Remembrance Day to honor all the people, especially older adults and people with disabilities, who died or were stricken with COVID-19.

The measure also expresses appreciation of first responders, caregivers and researchers who cared for victims or developed treatments or vaccines in response to the virus. The measure would not take effect until March of 2025 since March 10th of this year has already passed.

"I am very pleased to see action taken toward establishing COVID-19 Remembrance Day which would honor those who have been lost to or affected by COVID," said cosponsor Sen. Pat Jehlen (D-Somerville). "It also acknowledges the essential workers who helped us get through the hardest times and contributed to our commonwealth's recovery."

"At the time of the pandemic, I was the House Chair of the Joint Committee on Elder Affairs, and had an upfront seat, in a sense, to the tragedy that was unfolding especially in our nursing homes, and to aging adults, generally," said cosponsor Rep. Ruth Balser (D-Newton). "I feel it is important to remember those we lost and to honor those who helped keep us safe."



ALLOW SOME 17-YEAR OLDS TO VOTE IN PRIMARIES (H 705) Continued from front page

This bill would allow voters who will turn 18 eligible to vote and be in a November general election to also vote in the preceding primary election even though they will only be 17 at the time of the primary election.

Supporters said that allowing 17-year-olds olds to have a voice would

establish a foundation for lifelong engagement in the democratic process and bolster civic engagement of these youths.

Rep. Joan Meschino (D-Hull) first sponsored the bill in 2020 at the request of then-16-year-old Hingham High School student Samantha Bevins, now a 21-year-old junior at Dartmouth College studying Government and

Public Policy, who wanted this group to be allowed to vote in the Bay State's March 2020 presidential primary.

Bevins said she is thrilled to learn that the bill received initial approval. "I proposed this legislation ... when I was 16 because I wanted first-time voters in the commonwealth to have the same rights as my peers in 27 other

states and Washington, D.C.," said Bevins. "It is crucial that young people have the opportunity to fully participate in their first election cycle by having a say in the primaries on candidates who will ultimately be on the ballot in the general election. I am hopeful our bill will [receive further approval] soon in order to fully enfranchise first-time voters before the next Massachusetts state primaries."

"This legislation promotes a model of civic engagement and full enfranchisement that is critical to foster among our young people, who are the future of this country," said Meschino. "Hingham resident Samantha Bevins and her peers' contin-

ued engagement in the advocacy process during consecutive legislative sessions demonstrates that these young adults are fully equipped and ready for the opportunity to fully engage in the election process, and I commend them for their groundbreaking efforts."

"[The bill] will lead to increased voter turnout that transcends party lines and further engages the youngest voters," said cosponsor Rep. Jack Lewis (D-Framingham). "This furthers our civic engagement goals and aligns the commonwealth with 27 other states including Mississippi, Wyoming, West Virginia and Maine."





2024-18 Article XIV Section 14-2 is amended with the addition of the following language: Traffic Calming Petition - A petition indicating at least 9 residents, or 33% of the residents on the street (whichever is lower) support the implementation of a traffic calming device. 2024-19 Article XIV Section 14-3 is amended as follows: replace the current Warrants for Article XIV Installation table with "Proposed Traffic Calming Assessment Table - The City uses several metrics to assess the general characteristics of streets and the potential viability of traffic calming measures. A second group of metrics helps document priority considerations. Each metric is assigned a "Yes" or "No" designation. Metrics are described in more detail below."

2024-20 Article XIV Section 14-3 is amended as follows: replace the current Priority Ranking System language with "The above recommended metrics for Article XIV installation include a total of four thresholds and four priority considerations. The above analysis is used to direct data collection efforts to evaluate the proposed Traffic Calming Petition. After data collection, the proposed street is added to the traffic calming consideration list where it is evaluated alongside other traffic calming needs based on bi-annual data collection, community feedback, and staff recommendations. Traffic calming is also often implemented in pavement and sidewalk reconstruction projects through the City's Pavement Resurfacing Program. The length of time it takes to process a request and provide a recommendation, is subject to spring and fall data collection and the volume of requests. Streets at the top of the prioritization list will be more likely to receive funding and will be treated first.

2024-21 Article XIV Section 14-4 is amended as follows: replace the current Neighborhood Traffic Management Process with "(a) A resident alerts the City to a problem area, this can be done through methods such as contacting the City's 311 Services, emailing the Mobility Division, providing feedback as part of a project outreach process, or via a Councilor.

(b) Neighbors complete a petition (Traffic Calming Request Form, included in Appendix B) including a written description of the location of concern and requires the signatures of at least 9 residents, or 33% of the residents on the impacted street(s) (whichever is lower). Upon submission, the petition will be verified with City records to validate the residency status of the petitioners. The petition must be signed by the inhabitants of households who legally reside on the street. Only one handwritten signature per household will be considered.

(c) Once the petition is verified, the City will collect data in order to prepare an analysis evaluating the criteria for implementation.

(d) After data collection, the proposed street is added to the traffic calming consideration list where it is evaluated alongside traffic calming needs based on bi-annual data collection, constituent requests, and staff recommendations.

(e) The Traffic Commission votes to adopt, reject or modify the recommendations made by the City, if there are impacts to regulations under Traffic Commission's purview (for example, impacts to curb-side parking).







TOXIC CHEMICAL RELEASES HAVE DECLINED 21% IN 10 YEARS ACCORDING TO NEW TOXICS RELEASE INVENTORY DATA



Today, March 21, 2024, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency released its 2022 Toxics Release Inventory (TRI) National Analysis showing that environmental releases of TRI chemicals from facilities covered by the program were 21% lower in 2022 compared to 2013. This includes a 26% decrease in air releases. During this 10-year period, releases from manufacturing facilities decreased by 9% while the value added to the U.S. economy from manufacturing increased by 14%. While overall releases increased by 1% from 2021 to 2022, there was a 6.5% increase in the

number of pollution prevention activities reported under the TRI program compared to 2021.

The 2022 TRI National Analysis summarizes environmental releases of TRI chemicals, as well as how facilities managed their waste. In 2022, facilities reported managing 88.5% of their TRI chemical waste through preferred practices such as recycling, energy recovery and treatment, while releasing 11.5% of their TRI chemical waste into the environment.

"Communities have a right to

know how facilities in their backyards might be exposing them to toxic chemicals," said Assistant Administrator for the Office of Chemical Safety and Pollution Prevention Michal Freedhoff. "We are committed to sharing the information we collect from facilities openly and clearly, allowing people to find new ways to use this data to the benefit of us all."

EPA, states and Tribes receive TRI data from facilities in sectors such as manufacturing, mining, hazardous waste management and electric utilities. More than 21,000 facilities submitted reports on 522 of the 827 chemicals and chemical categories for which TRI reporting is required. The remaining 305 chemicals either were not manufactured, processed or used by facilities required to report to TRI or were not manufactured, processed or

used in amounts large enough to trigger reporting.

The 2022 TRI National Analysis features visualizations and analytical tools to make data more useful and accessible to communities. Readers can view data by state, Tribe, metropolitan area, EPA region and watershed using the "Where You Live" mapping tool. This tool also allows readers to view facility locations overlayed with demographic data to identify potential exposure to TRI chemical releases in communities, including overburdened communities. Community groups, policymakers and other stakeholders can use this information, along with other environmental data, to better understand which communities may be experiencing a disproportionate pollution burden and take action at the local level.

Additionally, the 2022 TRI National Analysis highlights trends and changes in waste management practices for specific sectors and chemicals in the Sector Profile and Chemical Profile sections. This year, the 2022 TRI National Analysis highlights the primary metals manufacturing sector alongside the standard profiles for electric utilities, chemical manufacturing and metal mining.

FREE PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION FOR VETERANS WHO ARE GOING TO MEDICAL APPOINTMENTS (H 3527)

This bill provides free transportation on the MBTA system for veterans who travel to or from a Veterans Administration hospital

for medical care.

The veteran must present proof of a medical appointment on the date of travel in the form of a notice from the Veterans Administration indicating the veteran's name and the date and the location of the appointment.

"I have heard from a number of veterans who say it can be a challenge to get transportation to their medical appointments," said sponsor Rep. Jerry Parisella (D-Beverly). "This bill would cover the cost of public transit for those seeking care at the Veterans Administration and help reduce one of the barriers, the cost of transportation, for those who have served our country with honor."

ALLOW YOUNGER YOUTH SOCCER REFEREES (H 1852)

This bill would allow minors who are 12- and 13-years-old to referee youth soccer games for matches in which the age bracket of the players is younger than the 12- or 13-year-old referee.

Other provisions require the referee's parents or guardians to provide the employer with a written consent form; require

the employer to provide the parent or guardian with written policies describing the responsibilities of a referee and provide the minor with training; and mandating that an adult representing the employer is on the premise during the match.

"This legislation would benefit both the youths in question and their communities as these programs are extended," said co-sponsor Rep. Kathy LaNatra (D-Kingston).






