


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

Were Italian immigrants coming from Italy forced to “Americanize” their names when coming thru Ellis Island to avoid persecution.

Billy's Answer:

No, the widespread story that Italian immigrants (or any immigrants) were routinely forced to “Americanize” their names by Ellis Island officials to avoid persecution is a myth.

Here's what actually happened:

Name Changes at Ellis Island

- Immigration officials at Ellis Island did not change immigrants' names as a standard practice.
- They worked from the ship's passenger manifest (created at the port of departure in Europe, usually by officials who spoke the immigrants' language or had translators).
- Officials at Ellis Island compared the person in front of them to the name already written on the manifest. They rarely wrote down new names — they verified existing ones.

• Spelling errors or minor variations sometimes occurred (e.g., “De Luca” written as “Deluca” or “Giovanni” as “John” on later documents), but this

was usually due to:

- Clerical mistakes
- Immigrants themselves giving simplified versions
- American clerks mishearing or miswriting phonetic names
- There was no official policy of forcing name changes for assimilation or to avoid persecution.

When and Why Names Were Actually Changed

Italian immigrants (especially southern Italians) often faced prejudice in the U.S., including discrimination, stereotypes as criminals, and anti-Catholic sentiment. Many voluntarily changed or Anglicized their names later — not at Ellis Island, but after arrival — for practical reasons:

- To get jobs (employers often rejected “foreign-sounding” names)
- To avoid discrimination in housing or social settings
- To help children fit in at school (e.g., Giuseppe → Joseph, Vincenzo → James/Vincent, Salvatore → Sam)
- Some Italian Americans in the early 20th century even encouraged name changes to appear less “ethnic.”

Famous Examples That Fuel the Myth

- The idea persists because many Ital-

ian Americans grew up hearing family stories like “Our name was changed at Ellis Island.”

- In reality, the original Italian name was usually preserved on the manifest, but later generations used an Americanized version in daily life, leading people to assume the change happened on arrival.

Evidence from Records

- Ellis Island manifests (available today on sites like Ancestry.com and the Statue of Liberty-Ellis Island Foundation) almost always show the original European spelling.
- The National Archives and historians (including the Ellis Island museum itself) confirm: Immigration officials had no authority or interest in changing names.

In short:

Italian immigrants were not forced to Americanize their names at Ellis Island. Most name changes happened later, voluntarily, due to social pressure and the desire to assimilate — not because a clerk decided “Rossi” sounded too Italian.

HOME ENERGY ASSISTANCE

The Healey Administration announced that the Trump Administration, after a month-long delay, released federal funding for the Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP)

and that all applications can now be processed. LIHEAP is a federal program, referred to as the Massachusetts Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP) in Massachusetts, that helps more than 150,000 Massachusetts households, representing

over 300,000 people, afford to heat their homes during the winter each year.

"Home energy assistance is one of the most important tools we have to keep people safe in the winter," said Housing and Livable

Communities Secretary Ed Augustus. "For many of the households we serve each year, HEAP is the difference between a warm home and an impossible choice between heat, food and medicine. Now that this funding has been released, our team

and our local partners are moving quickly so that seniors, families with children and people with disabilities can get the help they need as the cold weather sets in."

Somerville Speak Up Line: SOMERVILLE'S WATER METER DISASTER



Do you suspect you are overpaying for city water?

Dear Billy T and Somerville/Medford News Weekly Speakup Line,

I am a homeowner and landlord of a 3 family house in Ward 7. My water meter was changed 3 years ago. This past summer I noticed something was wrong with the water meter. It was spinning back and forth. My plumber shut off the main and the water meter continued to spin. He indicated that the water meter was

faulty.

I then notified MASS Installation--they were uncooperative regarding my request to change my water meter.

I was told by a close friend to contact the individual who supervises "Weights and Measures".... which became another rabbit hole of dead ends.

One thing about me- I don't give up, "squeaky wheel", that I am. Also,

retired so I happen to have a lot of time on my hands.

Walter Hass wrote an article for the Boston Globe months ago to raise awareness of the issues with our water meters. He indicated that the city bought the cheapest meters on the market.

Neil Viner, who works for the water department had visited my home more than several times.

He was rude and arrogant. Raised his voice when I challenged him about my water meter spinning. He asked me to put in a good word to Mayor Ballantyne.

How ridiculous is that? And by the way, I did make a call and was told, "THE MAYORS OFFICE DOESN'T TAKE CALLS". When have you ever hear that?

Of course I did not call Mayor Ballantyne because Neil was clearly not doing his job properly.

I generally pay about \$3,500 annually. The total occupants of our dwelling is 7 adults. I also maintain a 90x50 square lot and a flower garden including a 150 year old European Copper Beech which is being treated for bleeding canker, otherwise the 150 year old tree would die. So I must use water outdoors as well.

Something must be done about the water department of Somerville.

We sit in silence waiting for answers with no reply.

Is this the image Somerville should have? Continuing to ignore this problem?

I hope that when the new mayor occupy's his new office- the water department gets the first inspection and he begins a full investigation of why nothing has been done to correct the problems.

So Jake- if your reading this: Please look into why those of us with faulty

water meters who have repeatedly called begging for answers, only to be repeatedly ignored.

I am now forced to make monthly payments at city hall until I can pay off the balance due. If no one is willing to correct this problem, why are we not getting any answers? Every home, condo, building should be inspected to ensure water meters are working correctly.

Our family has lived in Somerville since 1930. I will be celebrating 100 years in 2030. Hopefully I will continue to be living in my home for many years to come.

Thank you to Billy Tauro for his continual service of exposing these issues with city hall.

It's time to start giving back to the loyal constituents of our city.


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
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Should We Trust Our Somerville Water Meters?

Outrageously High Water Bills? There's a remedy!

According to Chat GBT Grock when asked "Is it possible for a water meter model number VNLT-E-M1 3120897 together a false reading and to also have false spikes causing faulty readings?"

Answer:

Yes, it is possible for a water meter like the VNLT-E-M1 model (a smart, cellular-enabled meter commonly used in residential settings, such as those from Metron Farnier/Spectrum, with serial numbers like 3120897 indicating a specific unit) to produce false readings and erratic spikes in reported usage. For instance, pressure fluctuations or gas buildup in pipes can make the meter "spin" erratically without actual water movement, registering tiny false increments that accumulate into spikes. Software errors during data transmission (e.g., to a utility's server) might also corrupt readings.

3. Installation or Environmental Issues:

Poor sealing allows moisture ingress, fogging the display or corroding internals, which leads to inconsistent readings. High water pressure surges or temperature changes (e.g., hot water cooling in pipes) can trigger false positives, as the meter interprets expansion/contraction as flow.

4. Calibration Errors:

Meters are calibrated for specific flow rates; short bursts or low flows (e.g., from dripping faucets) can exceed error tolerances, causing overestimation. Newer smart meters like the VNLT-E-M1 may initially read higher than older analog ones due to better accuracy, mimicking a "spike."

5. External Factors Mimicking Meter Faults:

While not a meter issue per se, plumbing problems (e.g., a faulty expansion tank or check valve leaking under pressure) can cause the meter to register false flow.

• Unexpected Bill Increases:

A sudden jump (e.g., from 2,000 to 24,000 gallons) without lifestyle changes, guests, or seasonal use like lawn watering.

• Erratic Display:

The meter's low-flow indicator (often a small triangle or dial) spins or flickers when no water is running; readings change unusually fast/slow.

• Inconsistent Self-Checks:

Usage doesn't match known patterns (e.g., filling a 5-gallon bucket three times should increase the reading by exactly 15 gallons/2 cubic feet).

• No Visible Leaks:

Meter moves despite all fixtures off, but no dampness or sounds.

How to Test and Fix It

1. Basic Leak/Meter Test:

- Shut off all water (faucets, appliances, irrigation).
- Note the meter reading.
- Wait 1–2 hours (or overnight), then recheck. Any change indicates flow—either a hidden leak or meter error.

- For spikes, track daily readings for a week and compare to historical bills.

2. Contact Your Utility:

Report suspected faults—they own the meter and must inspect/replace it for free if defective. Provide your model (VNLT-E-M1) and serial (3120897) for quick lookup. In cases like Columbus, OH, utilities have acknowledged meter-related spikes during upgrades. Request a "meter accuracy test" or temporary bypass.

3. Professional Inspection:

If no leak is found, a plumber can check for pressure issues or internal faults. Replacement costs \$100–\$300 if not utility-covered, but smart meters like yours are often warrantied.

4. Prevention:

Install a water pressure regulator if surges are common, and monitor via utility apps (e.g., Aquahawk or WaterScope for VNLT-E-M1-compatible systems). Annual self-tests help catch issues early.

In summary, while the VNLT-E-M1 is designed for reliable remote readings, it's not immune to the faults that plague all water meters. Start with a simple shut-off test to rule out leaks, then escalate to your utility. This has resolved similar issues for many users facing unexplained spikes. PROTECT ALL PUBLIC TRANSIT WORKERS FROM ASSAULT AND BATTERY (S 2697)

Gov. Maura Healey signed into law legislation that would expand the current law which punishes anyone who commits assault and battery against a public employee including police officers, firefighters and emergency medical personnel. The bill ensures that all transit workers are covered, including those who are not directly employed by the state, such as workers employed by Keolis, the state's contracted commuter rail operator. The bill would also add "assault and battery by means of a bodily

substance including saliva, blood or urine" to the current law.

"Public transportation employees do important work every day to keep our trains and buses moving on time and ensure the safety of all passengers," said Gov. Healey. "They should never be subject to any form of assault simply for doing their jobs. This bill ensures that they have the protections they deserve and will enhance safety for all users of our public transportation system."

"All transit workers deserve to come

to work feeling safe and protected," said Interim MBTA General Manager Phillip Eng. "These employees work tirelessly to serve the public, keeping them moving safe and reliably. Transit workers work 365 days a year to ensure that we have a robust transit system that is safe, supporting riders that depend on mass transportation and allowing everyone the option to choose transit. Know that our labor workforce is dedicated, is a part of the communities they serve and deserves a workplace grounded in respect and security."

"This is a significant victory for everyone who rides or operates public transit," said Jim Evers, President of the Boston Carmen's Union Local 589. "Our MBTA bus and train operators deserve to be safe on the job and commuters deserve to know that public transportation is safe. This law will ensure that those who assault public transit workers will be held accountable and that our valued transportation employees are protected. Our transit workers keep Massachusetts moving every day and deserve our utmost respect."

"Every region of our economy depends on the people who keep the busses and trains humming, and this new law takes a strong step forward in protecting workers who show up every day to do just that," said Senate President Karen Spilka (D-Ashland). "Our historic investments in transit would mean nothing if not for the people who greet customers, run our transit systems and ensure the public is safe."

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



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Somerville Community Encouraged to Plan Ahead for Snowstorms



Park on the Odd Side During Winter 2025-2026
Snow Emergencies, Unless Otherwise Posted

SOMERVILLE- The City of Somerville is encouraging the community to get ready now for potential snowstorms by signing up for City Alerts and reviewing protocols for snow emergencies. Preparing now will help keep the community safe, as well as reduce ticketing or towing for snow emergency parking violations and ticketing for failure to follow shoveling requirements.

Alerts
Snow emergencies are announced in various ways, including through phone, text, and email alerts. Those who live, work, or own a business or property in Somerville are encouraged to sign up for City Alerts. Alerts are also available in multiple languages. Sign up at somervillema.gov

gov/alerts.

In addition to Somerville City Alerts, snow emergencies are announced the following ways: City website: somervillema.gov

Street Parking

Because this winter begins in an odd-numbered year, snow emergency parking is on the odd side of the street all winter. There are a small number of exceptions to the park odd rule, which will be noted by signs on those streets.

Once a snow emergency is declared, everyone has four hours to move their car to the odd-numbered side of the street, or to municipal lots that are available for use during a snow emergency. Parking is not allowed in school lots during snow emergencies.

Parking is allowed at meters on the odd-numbered side of the street during a snow emergency, as long as there is no sign stating otherwise. Meters and time-parking rules are not enforced during snow emergencies. The City also does not enforce an ordinance prohibiting cars from being parked in the same spot for more than 48 hours during snow emergencies.

Vehicles may be ticketed and towed if in violation of snow emergency parking rules.

Municipal Lot Parking

Municipal lots are available for parking during snow emergencies. Once the emergency is lifted, all cars must be moved from the lots within

two hours.

Grove Street Lot B (Grove St. east side at Elm St.)
Grove Street Lot C (Grove St. at Highland Ave.)
Magoun Square Lot (Broadway at Medford St.)
Mount Vernon St. Lot (Broadway at Mt. Vernon St.)
Union Square Lot (Washington St. at Bonner Ave.)
Founders Ice Arena (Bleachers Ct. at Somerville Ave.)
Winter Hill Lot A (Broadway, north side between Fellsway West and Wheatland St.)
Winter Hill Lot B (Broadway, north side between Wheatland St. and Grant St.)

Again, parking is not allowed in school lots during snow emergencies.

Snow Shoveling Support

The Somerville Teen Snow Shoveling Program returns for the 2025-2026 snow season. This is a paid opportunity for youth to help local seniors and homeowners with disabilities or medical

conditions after a snowstorm.

Residents interested in receiving snow shoveling assistance must submit an application and a CORI form by Thursday, January 1, 2026, to the Somerville's Council on Aging's Holland Street Center (167 Holland St.) and appear at the Holland Street Center in person with a government-issued photo ID (such as a driver's license, state ID, or passport). Forms may be completed ahead of time or upon arrival at the Center. Persons who are homebound can receive application assistance by contacting Debra Higgins at the Council on Aging at 617-625-6600 ext. 2321.

The program is available for teens aged 14 to 19 years old. All interested youths must submit an application. Youths aged 18 or 19 must also submit a CORI form.

Snow Shoveling Requirements

Property owners are responsible for removing snow and ice from sidewalks and accessible ramps that abut their property. The City places buckets of sand where possible in neighborhoods, which may be used to prevent slipping on your public walkways.

To comply with all shoveling rules:
Sidewalks need to be cleared within six daylight hours after the snow stops.
Shovel a path at least 3 feet wide and down to the pavement on sidewalks and ramps.
Do not shovel snow onto city streets unless the temperature is 40 degrees or higher, it is during

daylight hours, and snow and ice are broken up and spread evenly on the street to melt quickly.

These rules apply to all snowfall, not just when a snow emergency is declared. Failure to comply with the above rules may result in increasing fines issued until the walkway is clear.

Be a Good Neighbor This Winter

Please consider checking on seniors or persons with disabilities during and after snowstorms to ensure they are safe; have all the basic supplies, food/water, and medication they need; and that they have heat and are safe if there are power outages.

If you are physically able, please consider clearing storm drains in advance of storms, or shoveling out fire hydrants after snowfall. Always take breaks when you shovel.

If you have a driveway, please consider sharing it with tenants, neighbors, or friends during snow emergencies to free up spaces on the street (they might even help you shovel out as a thank you). If you feel comfortable and safe doing so, if you see a neighbor parking on the wrong side of the street, consider sharing snow emergency parking information with them and encouraging them to sign up for City Alerts.



PROVIDE FUNDS TO TEACHERS WHO PURCHASE SCHOOL SUPPLIES ONLINE (H 675/S 448)

Another bill heard by the Education Committee would create a School Supplies for Teachers Program to provide financial and technical assistance to eligible teachers who purchase school supplies online, for their students or themselves, and pay out of their own pocket.

Supplyateacher.org, a national nonprofit that provides teachers with a semester's worth of essential school supplies, says that 93 percent of teachers nationwide spend their own money on classroom supplies. According to their website, the group gives each teacher two large boxes filled with enough core school sup-

plies to last for at least one semester. They note that pencils, pencil pouches, folders, notebooks, sharpeners, erasers, rulers and pens are included in every box and that additional items are included based on grade level, such as crayons and markers for younger grades, and highlighters and colored pencils for older students.

Supporters of the bill say it is outrageous that teachers, many of whom are underpaid, are forced to buy supplies that the schools should be supplying.

Sen. Mike Rush (D-West Roxbury), the Senate sponsor of the bill and House sponsor Rep. Ed Philips (D-Sharon) did

not respond to repeated requests by Beacon Hill Roll Call asking them why they sponsored the bill.

James Cameron has had both patience and "research, research and research" when it comes to his *Avatar* franchise. With a germ of an idea in 1994, 31 years later the third installment is set to hit the theaters December 19, 2025.

JV writes: The *Avatar* 3 trailer is two minutes and twenty-five seconds of more wonderment from Pandora. Vibrant colors contrasted with a dark blue hue dominate the trailer as the story of wildlife vs technology is a component of what will be 4 decades of work on one project, in five pieces. 



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


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Somerville/Medford Remembering Robert W. Boudreau

GIVE VETERANS AN EXTRA 5 POINTS ON TEACHER LICENSING EXAMS (H 570)

The Education Committee held a hearing on a proposal that would give veterans an extra 5 points

on the education licensing exam which must be taken by anyone applying for a teacher's license.

"[The bill] recognizes the

leadership, discipline and real-world experience veterans bring to our classrooms and helps remove barriers as they transition into civilian careers, all

while strengthening our pipeline of qualified teachers," said sponsor Rep. Michael Finn (D- West Springfield.)

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STATUTE OF LIMITATIONS FOR VICTIMS OF ASBESTOS-RELATED DISEASES (H 4676)

The House gave initial approval to a measure that would exempt situations when a person contracts a latent disease from asbestos-related or other toxic material exposure arising from property improvements, from the current statute of limitations, which limits the time period during which the person

can file a lawsuit.

Under current law, actions are subject to a 3-year limitation and a 6-year statute of repose. That means that tort actions arising from improvements to real property must be brought within 3 years from when the cause of actions accrues, but, in any event, not more than 6 years after the improvement has

been completed.

"This bill will move us in line with a majority of states that have protection in place for such victims of latent diseases," said sponsor Rep. Jeff Roy (D-Franklin). "It will remove the statute of repose on tort claims arising from latent diseases, while also applying retroactively to allow any person

who has been affected prior to enactment to bring an action to recover damages. The state's Supreme Judicial Court has encouraged us to do so by stating the following in its opinion: 'The plaintiffs point out that a number of other state legislatures have effectively exempted asbestos-related illnesses from their respective statutes of repose concerning improvements

to real property. We encourage our Legislature to consider doing the same should it determine that such an exception is consonant with the commonwealth's public policy."

BAN HOSTILE ARCHITECTURE THAT TARGETS THE HOMELESS (H 3307)

The House gave initial approval to legislation that would prohibit the state, the MBTA and cities and towns from constructing "hostile architecture" that supporters of the ban say targets the homeless and tries to push them out of certain areas. The bill defines hostile architecture as "any building or structure that is designed or intended to prevent unhoused individuals from sitting or lying on the building or

structure at street level."

"Public space should be for people to use and enjoy, and constructing public spaces that are hostile to people experiencing homelessness doesn't actually address the causes of homelessness," said sponsor Rep. Mike Connolly (D-Cambridge). "Instead of pushing homelessness further into the shadows, we need a comprehensive solution to homelessness that includes a right to housing."

Supporters say that family homelessness in Greater Boston has doubled over the last decade, shelters are overcrowded and waiting lists for affordable housing are in the tens of thousands. They note that policies that sterilize the homelessness crisis in public spaces are not only inhumane, but they also only serve to mask the problem.

According to Robert Rosenberger, an associate professor of

philosophy at Georgia Institute of Technology, who has studied and written extensively on the subject, hostile architecture includes armrests that divide benches so that the bench is not long enough to sleep on, sprinklers that are turned on at night and certain trash cans. "Garbage cans ... serve several functions for people living unsheltered," said Rosenberger. "Some people use garbage cans as a source of recyclable materials [which] can often be exchanged for a small

sum of money. Garbage cans are also sometimes approached as a source of discarded food." He notes that many newer garbage cans are built so that people cannot reach inside them to obtain recycled bottles or cans or leftover food."

ESTABLISH MINIMUM PAY FOR SUBSTITUTE TEACHERS (H 580)

The Education Committee's hearing also included legislation that would require public schools to pay substitute teachers 85 percent of what schools pay a beginning teacher who holds a bachelor's degree; or the state's current \$15

per hour minimum wage – whichever is greater.

The salary of the substitute teacher would be calculated by the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education, using the latest data available. The bill would not apply to substitute teachers rep-

resented in a bargaining unit in the school district which employs them.

Supporters say that schools need quality substitute teachers to operate. They argue that substitute teachers are underpaid despite serving an important purpose in elemen-

tary and secondary school across the state.


